# Report by Housing, Operations and Development to Regulatory Panel of 28<sup>th</sup> March 2024

Subject: Public Access Exemption Order: The South Ayrshire Council (Royal Troon Golf Course 152nd Open) Exempting Land from Access Rights (No. 3) Order, 2024

# 1. Purpose

1.1 This report seeks authority to undertake a public consultation on a proposed temporary public access exemption Order under Section 11 of the Land Reform Act (Scotland) 2003 for areas of land affected by the 152nd Open 2024 at Royal Troon Golf Course.

#### 2. Recommendation

#### 2.1 It is recommended that the Panel:

2.1.1 Approves the commencement of a public consultation on the proposed temporary public access exemption order under Section 11(1) of The Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003, for the area of land at Royal Troon Golf Course and a section of the Smugglers Trail/Wrack Road (Core Paths SA1, SA2 and SA6 and Right of Way SKC 28), as set out in Appendix 1.

### 3. Background

- 3.1 The 152<sup>nd</sup> Open 2024 is to be held over the Royal Troon Course from 14<sup>th</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> July 2024 inclusive. The R & A has requested that the Council makes access exemption orders under Section 11 of The Land Reform Act 2003 to facilitate the safe and successful setting up and dismantling of temporary structures, staging of the event and to permit the charging of an entrance fee during the event, covering South Beach car park, the Course itself, as well as the core paths and right of ways which cross it.
- 3.2 The Regulatory Panel on 6<sup>th</sup> December 2023 agreed to make three temporary public access exemption orders for land at Royal Troon Golf Course, including sections of the core paths SA1, SA2 and SA6 and right of way SKC 28. These Orders were referred to Scottish Ministers in December for approval, as required by legislation. Orders nos. 1 and 2, and the Order for South Beach Car Park, have now been approved and will come into force on the agreed dates. However Scottish Ministers have refused Order No.3, which would apply for the dates 24<sup>th</sup> June 29<sup>th</sup> July 2024 inclusive, on the grounds that the Notices issued for the consultation process did not include as the one of the reasons for making the Order that there will be an entrance fee charged during the period of the Open event. As such, Scottish Ministers have directed that the Council should reconsult on Order No.3, with new public Notices to be issued containing amended wording.

### 4. Proposal

- 4.1 The area for which the R & A is seeking a temporary public access exemption order:
  - 4.1.1 <u>Area</u> This area covers the entire golf course, therefore during the event itself, the R & A has requested that access rights exemption applies over the land and routes (Appendix 1) for the dates 24<sup>th</sup> June 29<sup>th</sup> July 2024 inclusive.
  - 4.1.2 For the period during which the relevant exemption order is in force, there will be no diversion route available for the Smugglers Trail where it crosses the course, or for the golf access road. The Ayrshire Coastal Path will be temporarily diverted along Troon beach, at a distance of at least 10m from the western boundary of the golf course.

### 4.2 Consultation

- 4.3 The period of consultation will take 21 days and will include a press advert, Council website updates and social media communications, site notices as well as direct consultation with the landowner, the Local Access Forum, Troon Community Council, and the local Elected Members for this ward.
- 4.4 Following the consultation period, this Panel will be asked to consider any representations made on the proposed Order and for their agreement to make the Order. The access exemption order will then be submitted to the Scottish Ministers for confirmation. Assuming the Ministers confirm the Order, a further public notice (of confirmation) will be published in the local press and on the Council's website, in compliance with the legislation.
- 4.5 The previous Orders, requested by the R and A for the 152<sup>nd</sup> Open 2024 (for specific areas within the Golf Course boundary and for the South beach car park), have been confirmed by Scottish Ministers and will come into force on the dates specified in those Orders. A public notice relating to these confirmed Orders has been published in the local press, to advise the public.

### 5. Legal and Procurement Implications

- 5.1 The recommendations in this report are consistent with legal requirements (the relevant provisions of The Land Reform (Scotland) Act 2003).
- 5.2 There are no procurement implications arising from this report.

#### 6. Financial Implications

6.1 Costs associated with undertaking the public consultation and making the access exemption order can be met from existing Planning budgets, advert costs will be recoverable from the R & A as event organiser. There will be no ongoing financial commitments arising from this report.

### 7. Human Resources Implications

7.1 There are no human resource implications arising directly from the recommendation of this report.

#### 8. Risk

### Risk Implications of adopting the recommendations.

8.1 There is a risk access takers visiting the area may be unaware the Course and the Core Paths and Right of Way across it have been exempted temporarily from access rights. This will be mitigated by publishing notices of the exemption orders in the local press and on the Council's website, and by erecting signage on site, and by the use of security/marshals (as arranged by the R & A) on site.

## Risk Implications of rejecting the recommendations.

8.2 Rejecting the recommendation to undertake the public consultation would mean that the Order could not be made, which could jeopardise the staging of the 152nd Open 2024. There could also be a health and safety risk associated with not creating the order, in that members of the public could attempt to access the Course during the golf event.

# 9. Equalities

9.1 The proposals in this report have been assessed through the Equality Impact Assessment Scoping process. There are no significant potential positive or negative equality impacts of agreeing the recommendations and therefore an Equalities Impact Assessment is not required. A copy of the Equalities Scoping Assessment is attached as Appendix 2.

# 10. Sustainable Development Implications

- 10.1 Considering Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) This report does not propose or seek approval for a plan, policy, programme or strategy or document otherwise described which could be considered to constitute a plan, programme, policy or strategy.
- 10.2 The recommendation of this report will have no significant environmental benefit or cost.

13.1 There has been no public consultation on the contents of this report.



NO YES (A full EIA must be carried out on all high and medium impact proposals) Rationale for decision: The proposal is necessary to facilitate the successful staging of a major, international golf tournament that will accrue significant economic development benefits for the entire community of South Ayrshire. The proposal is to exempt temporarily from statutory access rights Royal Troon Golf Course and paths that traverse it (the Ayrshire Coastal Path and Wrack Road), in the interests of health, safety and security. The exemption orders will have an equal, slight negative effect on all access takers who might wish to traverse the Course during preparation for the Tournament and the event itself, as they will be unable to do so for the duration of the orders. The number of access takers who might fall into one or all of the protected characteristic groups - likely to be affected by the proposal will be small relative to the entire community of South Ayrshire.
