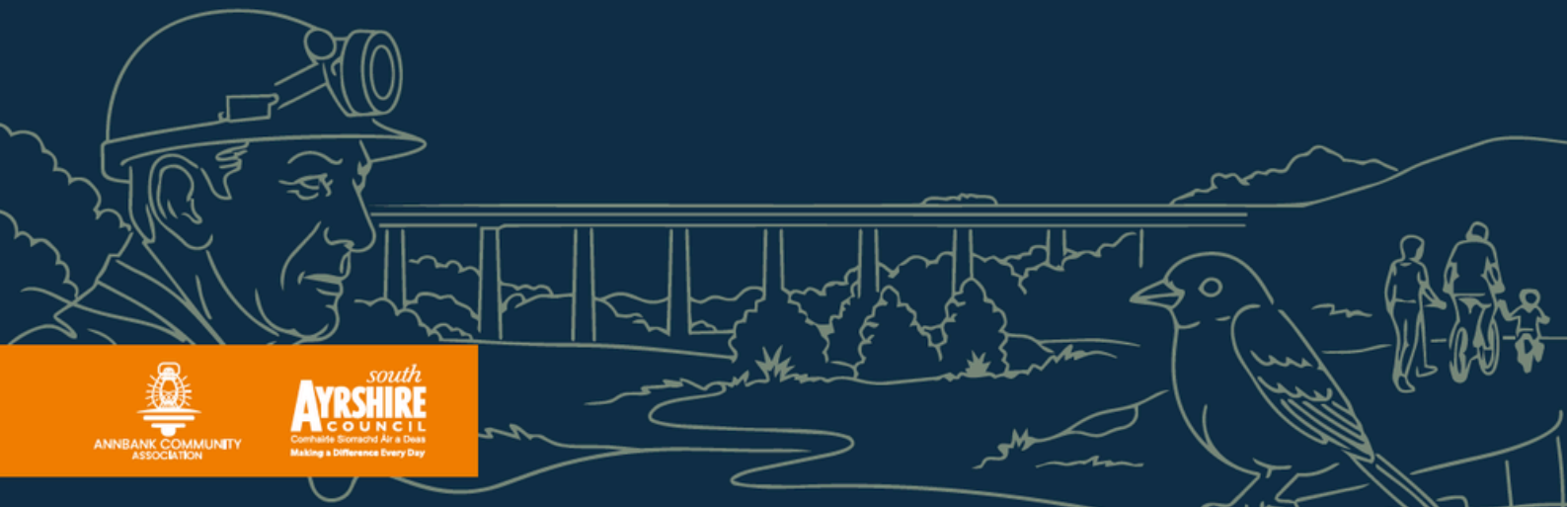

Welcome

This Community-led Action Plan (CAP) sets out a clear and strategic roadmap for the sustainable development of Annbank over the period 2026 – 2032. Developed by the Annbank Community Association (ACA), in consultation with residents and supported by South Ayrshire Council, the plan responds to the village's unique transition from a historic coal-mining community to a vibrant and well-connected rural settlement.

Our vision is to strengthen Annbank as a resilient and inclusive community, where residents can access essential services, opportunities, and shared spaces within a convenient 20-minute journey, whether on foot, by bicycle, mobility aid, or public transport.

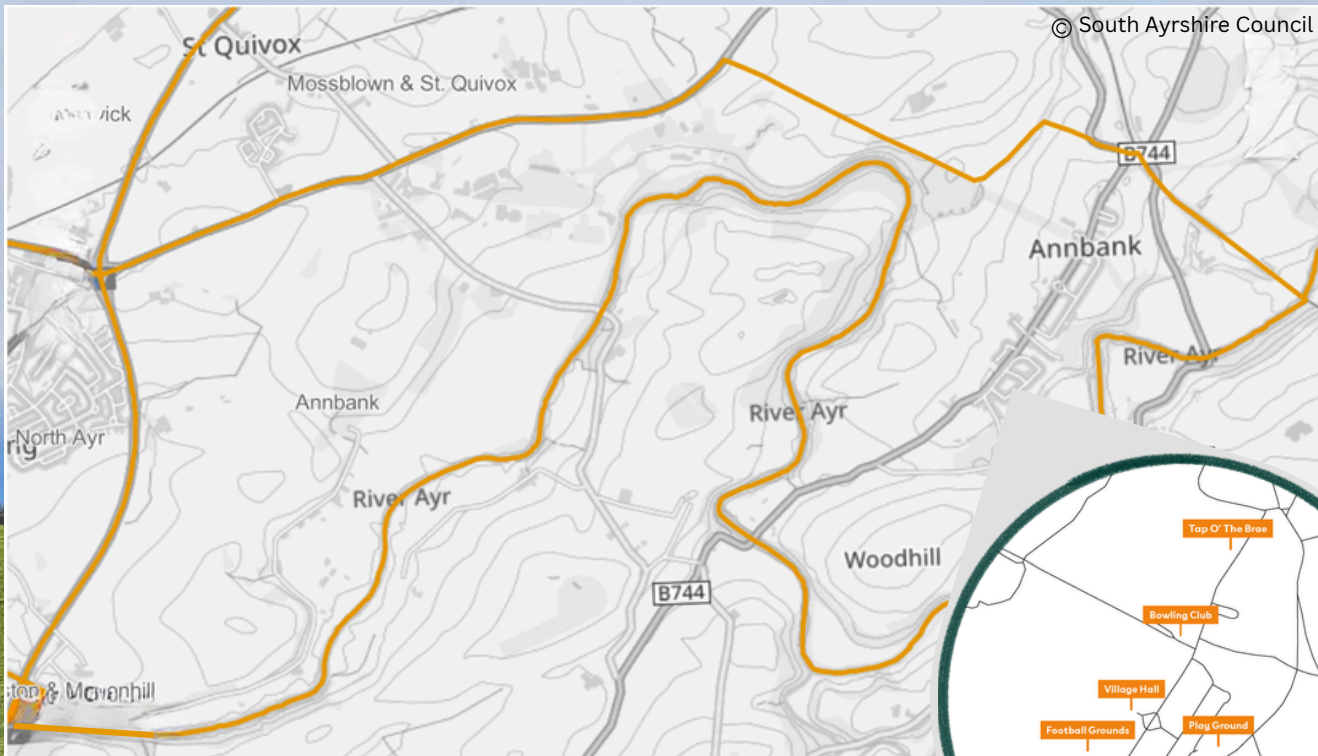
The plan is built around four key pillars of resilience, across each of the priorities: infrastructure and connectivity; economic and digital growth; community wellbeing; and heritage and tourism. Together, these priorities ensure that Annbank develops as more than a place to live or commute from, but as a community that actively contributes to the wider region through its facilities, green spaces, local initiatives, and volunteer-led projects.

By championing community ownership and supporting initiatives such as the Night Before Christmas Campaign, this plan aims to strengthen local identity, build pride, and create a sustainable future for Annbank as a thriving and self-sufficient community within South Ayrshire.

HOW WE CONSULTED

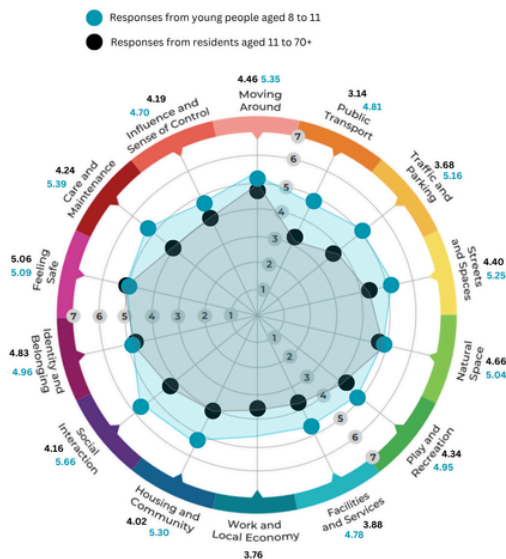
In May 2024, we launched a comprehensive community survey. While we recognise it was detailed and required a significant commitment of time, the depth of feedback received has enabled the development of a robust, evidence-based plan that the community can be proud of.

We extend our sincere thanks to the 77 adult residents and 36 children (P4-P7) from Annbank Primary School who took part. These 113 unique perspectives have directly shaped the priorities set out in this document.

The survey was developed using the Place Standard Tool (PST). This framework enabled the evaluation of fourteen key themes, ranging from physical infrastructure, such as traffic management and parking, to the social aspects of village life, including community safety and sense of belonging.

By benchmarking these results against the 2022 Community Conversations, areas where Annbank is performing well, as well as where improvements are needed, have been clearly identified. This evidence has directly informed the development of the Community-led Action Plan (CAP) for 2026 – 2032, with actions structured across short-term (Years 1-2), medium-term (Years 3-5), and long-term (Years 6-7) priorities.

The results of this assessment are illustrated in the Place Standard diagram above, highlighting key strengths and areas for improvement identified by both young people and adult residents.



Without a formal action plan, Annbank risks a significant gap in its strategic development process. In the absence of a clear, community-led framework, public bodies and statutory agencies are often left to form their own understanding of the village's needs and priorities. This plan ensures that the voices of residents remain the central driver of local decision-making.

Developed in partnership between the Annbank Community Association (ACA) and South Ayrshire Council (SAC), this document provides a clear, shared framework for action. It sets out community-defined priorities to guide investment, support funding applications, and influence policy decisions throughout the 2026-2032 period. As such, it serves as a formal mandate to champion Annbank's interests and support the long-term sustainability of the village.

OUR VILLAGE HISTORY

Annbank began as a planned coal-mining village in the nineteenth century, built to support a growing workforce. Life was often challenging, but from the beginning, residents created a strong community centred on shared spaces, education, and mutual support.

Mining shaped daily life for generations, bringing both hardship and inequality. Yet these experiences also built resilience and a strong sense of togetherness that continues to define the village today. Over time, community life flourished through local facilities, the church, and sport, helping to strengthen identity, pride, and belonging.

Today, that same community spirit underpins the Annbank Community-led Action Plan (2026 – 2032). By building on its history, the village is working together to improve local facilities, support wellbeing, and ensure a vibrant, sustainable future for everyone.

Priority 1

SPACES AND PLACES

Outcomes

Actions

1. Caring for our environment and making Annbank accessible to all.

Short-term

1.1 Annbank is a low-crime area with a considerate and respectful community. The **Annbank Community Association (ACA)** aims to ensure these values are preserved and passed on to future generations. To further enhance the village, **the community** will:

1.1.1 Sustain active engagement and volunteering with local groups.

1.1.2 Maintain a regular programme of community litter-picking events.

1.1.3 Work in partnership with organisations, including South Ayrshire Ranger Service, South Ayrshire Council (SAC), to protect and maintain wildflower meadows at Goodwin Drive and Whitehill Crescent, while exploring Brown's Crescent as a potential rewilding site.

1.1.4 Promote responsible waste disposal by encouraging the use of general and dog waste bins, noting that bagged dog waste can be placed in general litter bins.

1.2 **Residents** are encouraged to report dog fouling incidents to SAC Environmental Health team (contact details provided at the back of this booklet).

1.3 **ACA** will work with partners, including Environmental Health, local schools and community groups, to support and promote anti-dog fouling campaigns.

1.4 Ensure public spaces are accessible to all by working with third-sector organisations, such as the South Ayrshire Access Panel (SAAP), to assess and improve mobility and accessibility across the village.

Medium-term

1.5 **ACA** will work to establish the River Ayr as a premier natural asset for the village. The Association will collaborate with the Ayrshire Rivers Trust (ART) and other relevant partners to:

1.5.1 Implement strategic control of invasive non-native species.

1.5.2 Enhance educational opportunities by facilitating local school projects.

1.5.3 Restore and stabilise riverbanks using green engineering techniques.

1.5.4 Promote biodiversity and conservation.

1.6 **ACA** will consult with the South Ayrshire Ranger Service to identify and develop community projects that integrate sustainability & environment; health & wellbeing; and education & skills.

1. Continued.

1.7 Following the completion of the accessibility audit, **ACA** will submit the finding to Ayrshire Roads Alliance (ARA) to advocate for necessary infrastructure improvements, including resurfacing, installation of dropped kerbs, and widening of pavements.

Long-term

1.8 The **Association** will work to expand facilities and improve the accessibility of outdoor spaces to bolster the mental and physical wellbeing of the village. The Association will explore and implement projects including but not limited to active travel and discovery (nature trails, cycling paths); inclusive amenities (seating areas, sensory gardens); village aesthetics (flower bedding and planters); and blue-green infrastructure.

Ongoing

1.9 The ACA encourages **residents** to use the ARA digital services to report local infrastructure issues such as potholes, street lighting failures, and blocked drains (contact details at the back of the booklet).

2. A balanced and inclusive housing provision supporting current and future community needs.

Short-term

2.1 **ACA** will seek external funding and professional expertise to commission a feasibility study of the village core. This survey will identify potential sites suitable for: sheltered and assisted living; accessible housing and community-led development.

Medium-term

2.2 **ACA** will engage in strategic discussions with relevant partners such as Housing at SAC, the Registered Social Landlords (RSLs) and others to advocate for a diverse range of housing options.

Long-term

2.3 **ACA** will engage with SAC through the Local Development Plan 3 (LDP3) process and planning requirements to advocate for a diverse housing mix (starter homes, social and private) tailored for rural settlements.

3. Accessible and sustainable transport that connects people to services and opportunities.

Short-term

3.1 **ACA** will maintain an active dialogue with the Strathclyde Partnership for Transport (SPT) and local operators to address transport concerns.

3.1.1 Improve coordination of public transport timetables to strengthen connections between services.

3.1.2 Advocate for the restoration and enhancement of local routes.

3.1.3 Monitor service impacts on vulnerable residents and campaign for socially necessary services where required.

3.2 **ACA** will establish a dedicated Transport Project Group to evaluate the connectivity needs of the area. **The Transport Project Group** will be responsible for:

3.2.1 Conducting community-wide surveys to establish current demand, identify peak travel times, and understand resident priorities.

3.2.2 Developing a comprehensive service matrix for Annbank and the neighbouring villages.

Medium-term

3.3 In conjunction with the Transport Project Group, **ACA** will explore the feasibility of a community-led transport network to complement existing services, including:

3.3.1 Designing a network that links local villages with frequent, synchronised connections to major transport hubs in Ayr and Kilmarnock.

3.3.2 Acquiring a fleet of fully accessible vehicles and implementing a robust digital booking system. While open to the whole community, the scheme will prioritise vulnerable residents for essential journeys, such as medical and hospital appointments.

3.3.3 Recruiting and training a team of volunteer drivers. All volunteers will undergo rigorous safety protocols, including PVG (Protection of Vulnerable Groups) checks, driving competency assessments, and insurance verification.

3.3.4 Securing capital and revenue funding (Scottish Government's Community Transport Fund) to cover vehicle procurement, long-term maintenance, and the administration of the dispatch system.

3.3.5 Prioritising the acquisition of Zero-Emission Vehicles (ZEVs), such as electric minibuses, to align with Scotland's Net Zero targets.

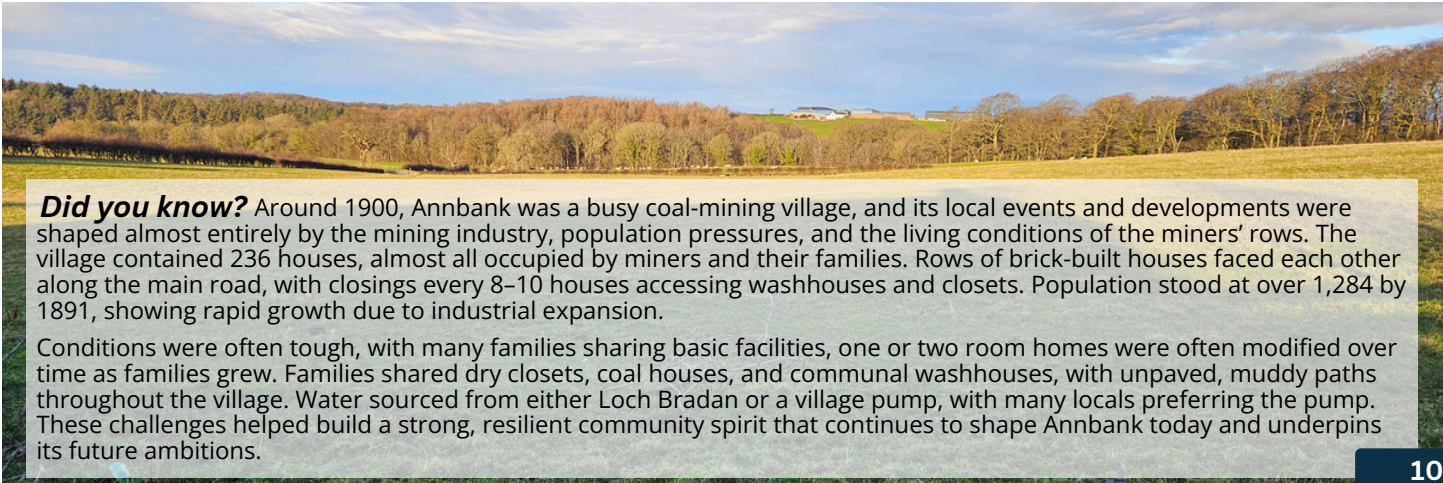
4. Safe, well-managed traffic and parking that supports residents and visitors.

Short-term

- 4.1 **ACA** will consult with ARA and SAC to survey the village core and identify opportunities for improved parking provision, including formalised parking bays (e.g. Whitehill Crescent).
- 4.2 **ACA** to collaborate with the ARA to improve road safety through:
- 4.2.1 Assessing and installing Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) near the village hall and improving visibility of the speed limit sign near the local shop.
 - 4.2.2 Monitoring national guidance on the introduction of 20mph speed limits and adapting proposals where appropriate.
 - 4.2.3 Identifying and implementing traffic calming measures on Weston Avenue.

Long-term

- 4.3 **ACA** will propose the development of dedicated parking at Brocklehill Avenue, (opposite the Bowling Club), to support residents and enhance access to the River Ayr (Annbank) walking route.



Did you know? Around 1900, Annbank was a busy coal-mining village, and its local events and developments were shaped almost entirely by the mining industry, population pressures, and the living conditions of the miners' rows. The village contained 236 houses, almost all occupied by miners and their families. Rows of brick-built houses faced each other along the main road, with closings every 8–10 houses accessing washhouses and closets. Population stood at over 1,284 by 1891, showing rapid growth due to industrial expansion.

Conditions were often tough, with many families sharing basic facilities, one or two room homes were often modified over time as families grew. Families shared dry closets, coal houses, and communal washhouses, with unpaved, muddy paths throughout the village. Water sourced from either Loch Bradan or a village pump, with many locals preferring the pump. These challenges helped build a strong, resilient community spirit that continues to shape Annbank today and underpins its future ambitions.



"The spaces in our area such as the park/picnic area and village hall are maintained and cared for by local volunteers. Without the hard work and community spirit of our volunteers Annbank Village Hall would have been closed and abandoned. The burden of maintaining is unfairly placed on the shoulders of the community."

Priority 2

LIVE, WORK AND LEARN

Outcomes

Actions

5. An active and inclusive community where people of all ages can connect and participate.

Short-term

5.1 **ACA** to Seek funding to recruit a full-time or part-time Community Development Officer to design and deliver intergenerational programmes that strengthen community connection and reduce social isolation. Key initiatives for the **Community Development Officer** will include:

5.1.1 Seasonal programmes: Deliver the 'Three Villages' summer and winter activity schedules.

5.1.2 Intergenerational day trips: Organise inclusive trips for all ages to destinations such as Blackpool, Millport, and seasonal markets.

5.1.3 Targeted social activities: Deliver a range of activities including youth-focused events (e.g. 'Messy Play' and park days) alongside initiatives for older residents such as dementia-friendly cafés and an intergenerational community seed-swapping club.

6. Safe and accessible active travel routes connecting our community.

Short-term

6.1 **ACA** to liaise with SAC and ARA to address the critical lack of safe walking, wheeling, and cycling infrastructure connecting Annbank to neighbouring villages and towns, with priority given to developing a safe route to school between Annbank and Annbank Primary School in Mossblown.

6.2 **ACA** to consult with SAC and ARA to conduct a feasibility study for a dedicated route between Annbank to Ayr route. This proposal seeks to link Mossblown Toll, Auchincruive, and Whitellets to the National Cycle Network. This will include upgrading, maintaining and improving existing paths to ensure safe, year-round use.

Medium-term

6.3 Work with SAC to assess the feasibility of enhancing the River Ayr Way corridor between Auchincruive and Annbank to support a wider range of recreational uses, including technical off-road cycling trails. This will explore opportunities to introduce designated trail sections suitable for sport and leisure while ensuring environmental sensitivity and accessibility are considered.

7. High-quality, inclusive play and leisure spaces for all ages.

Short-term

7.1 **ACA** proposes that Annbank formally adopts the Play Scotland Play Charter. This commitment will ensure the rights of children and young people to play are recognised and embedded in future village planning and development.

7.2 Encourage residents to report maintenance issues at Goodwin Drive children's playpark to SAC Grounds Maintenance team (contact details provided at the back of this booklet).

7.3 ACA to secure funding to upgrade facilities and equipment at Annbank Village Hall to better support community use. Key requirements include:

7.3.1 Sports equipment: To support local clubs and promote physical activity and health.

7.3.2 Integrated AV systems: High-quality audio and visual equipment for events, cinema nights and meetings.

7.3.3 Events and play resources: Equipment to support community events, youth activities and family engagement.

7.3.4 Outdoor garden enhancements: Improved seating, furniture and equipment to enhance the outdoor space.

Medium-term

7.4 **ACA** to liaise with SAC to obtain and review updates from the Play Sufficiency Assessment (PSA), ensuring Annbank's recreational needs are clearly reflected in Local Development Plan 3, in line with Scottish Government guidance.

7.5 **ACA** to partner with SAC Thriving Communities to audit youth services for 10 to 16-year-olds, identifying gaps in provision and ensuring services are better aligned with the needs and interests of young people in Annbank.

8. A resilient local economy with improved employment opportunities and digital connectivity.

Short-term

8.1 In view of actions 9.8 and 10.4 of this plan, support local employment and enterprise by working with Business Gateway Ayrshire to connect residents with advice, funding and opportunities to develop new businesses and start-ups within the village.

8.2 Recognise the growth in home-based working and advocate for improved digital infrastructure, including enhanced fibre broadband provision.

Medium-term

8.3 Secure funding to deliver electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure at Annbank Village Hall, including provision for operational and public use, through programmes such as ChargePlace Scotland and the Energy Saving Trust.

Did you know? Historically a coal mining hub, Annbank's economy has transitioned from heavy industry to one shaped by local estates, agriculture, and its connections to nearby towns.

While many residents travel to surrounding employment centres (within and outwith South Ayrshire), the village is increasingly striving to function as a more self sustaining rural community rather than simply a place to commute from.

To support this shift, there is a growing need to strengthen local access to essential services and to improve public transport options, ensuring that residents can reach work, education, shops, health services, and community facilities within a convenient 20 minute journey by foot, bicycle, mobility aid, or public transport. Enhancing these connections will help Annbank reduce reliance on car use, support local livelihoods, and contribute to wider environmental goals.





"There is no facility for the community to access to free computers for the kids and older residents, especially those who might need tuition on their use. The internet in the village has improved over the past few years but there is still a lot of room for improvement."

Priority 3

CIVIC AND COMMUNITY PRIDE

Outcomes

Actions

9. Stronger community identity through partnership and resilience.

Short-term

9.1 Work in partnership with the Health and Social Care Partnership (HSCP) Ayr South and Villages Locality Planning Partnership (LPP) to maintain a community resilience team for Annbank, Mossblown and Tarbolton, transitioning from reactive crisis response to sustainable, long-term support.

9.2 **ACA** to secure funding for the acquisition and the installation of a backup generator for Annbank Village Hall, enabling the facility to operate as an Emergency Resilience Hub during power outages and severe weather, with heating and food preparation capabilities.

9.3 In line with 9.2 equip the Annbank Village Hall, **ACA** is to secure funding for a dedicated emergency resource cache. This stock will include essential provisions such as water, non-perishable food, advanced first-aid kits, lighting, batteries, and thermal blankets to support residents during a crisis.

9.4 Strengthen community communication through the regular publication of the 'Oor Villages' newsletter. Working with local businesses for distribution, this will provide an accessible offline information source supported by a social enterprise model (e.g. sales or donations).

9.5 Promote a circular economy by developing a shared 'Library of Things', enabling residents to borrow items such as gazebos, PA systems and event equipment, supported by an online booking system.

Medium-term

9.6 While Annbank is deeply interconnected and interdependent with Mossblown and Tarbolton, **ACA** is committed to preserving Annbank's unique heritage and individual identity. We will ensure that collaborative 'Three Villages' initiatives such as the 'Oor Villages' newsletter reinforce the unique character and community spirit of our village.

9.7 Annbank takes immense pride in its diverse range of social, commercial, and natural assets. We are mindful of the vital role played by our community-led spaces: the Village Hall, Community Garden and Church; our recreational hubs: The 'Bowling Club, Tap o' the Brae, the Fishery and the Annbank United Community Football Club; our private sector and social enterprise partners: the local shop, River Garden, the Enterkine, Auchincruive, and Gadgirth Estates. **ACA** will work to strengthen these relationships to ensure the village remains a vibrant place to live, work, and visit.

10. A supported, valued and sustainable volunteer network.

Ongoing

10.1 **ACA** and **NBCC** recognise and value the contribution of local and visiting volunteers who support community activity in Annbank. To ensure a high-quality experience, we strictly adhere to the Volunteer Charter, ensure a high-quality, safe and supportive experience for short, medium, and long-term volunteers.

11. Community assets secured and sustained for future generations.

Ongoing

11.1 **ACA** to continue negotiations and legal processes with SAC to complete the Community Asset Transfer (CAT) of Annbank Village Hall and associated land. Securing community ownership will protect the facility's future and enable delivery of long-term improvements outlined in this plan.

11.1.1 Following a successful CAT, **ACA** will ensure the village hall is formally held in trust as a permanent community-owned asset. This legal structure will secure the building's status, ensuring it remains under local control and is managed solely for the benefit of the residents of Annbank and the geographical communities of NBCC.

11.1.2 Use community ownership to unlock access to capital funding streams, including the Scottish Land Fund and Community Ownership Fund, supporting the delivery of infrastructure improvements set out in this Community-led Action Plan.

Medium-term

11.2 **ACA** to secure funding to undertake a comprehensive low-carbon retrofit of Annbank Village Hall, including the installation of solar photovoltaic (PV) panels, air source heat pumps (ASHP), battery storage, and high-efficiency thermal systems. This will reduce operating costs and support national Net Zero targets.

11.3 **ACA** to identify funding to commission a feasibility study for a sustainable modular expansion of the Annbank Village Hall and its grounds. This project aims to transform the facility into a Multipurpose Community Hub, serving as a catalyst for economic regeneration and community wealth building, with flexible spaces for enterprise, tourism, and local services which could include:

11. *Continued.*

11.3.1 Hospitality and tourism links: Develop catering facilities to service hall events and a dedicated Village Café, positioned on the River Ayr Way, this facility will function as a strategic 'walkers' stop', capturing tourism spend and generate income to support the hall.

11.3.2 Enterprise and wellbeing suites: Create flexible units for local micro-businesses and health practitioners (e.g. health/beauty, podiatry, physiotherapy). This facilitates local service delivery and provides affordable space for start-up entrepreneurs.

11.3.3 Skills and digital inclusion hub: Develop multi-use spaces equipped for IT access and training, first aid certification, and professional development, whilst supporting the production of the 'Oor Villages' newsletter.

11.3.4 Circular economy infrastructure: Establish a shared community-owned wood and tool store, to promote reuse of materials and access to equipment, supporting a culture of repair and sustainability.

11.3.5 Climate resistance and food security: Develop allotments, shared growing spaces and a community orchard to support local food production, security and environmental sustainability.

12. A welcoming destination that celebrates local heritage and community pride.

Ongoing

12.1 **ACA** will collaborate with SAC Destination South Ayrshire (DSA) and other partners to enhance the Annbank as a visitor destination and strengthen the local tourism offer through:

12.1.1 Interpretive signage: Install high-quality information boards within the community garden to share the village's story and heritage.

12.1.2 River Ayr Way enhancements: Improve access, maintenance, and signage along the River Ayr Way corridor, highlighting local biodiversity (including otters, badgers, and herons) and key historical connections to William Wallace and the Covenanters.

12.1.3 Active travel resources: Define local walking routes and produce maps and promotional materials for integration into the DSA digital platforms.

Medium-term

12.2 **ACA** to secure funding to commission a professional community heritage audit to accurately document Annbank's historical significance. This evidence will underpin interpretation and promotional activities, supporting actions 12.1.1, 12.1.3, and 13.2, with a focus on the village's mining heritage, Covenanter history, and connections to William Wallace.

13. Annbank's mining heritage preserved, celebrated and shared.

Short-term

13.1 **ACA** will champion the 'Ancestry Detectives' initiative to promote and preserve Annbank's mining heritage through community-led research, exhibitions and storytelling, highlighting connections between past and present residents.

13.2 **ACA** seeks to develop a network of interpretive signage, information boards, and heritage maps across the village, creating an accessible 'industrial heritage trail', linking former pit sites and key landmarks.

Medium-term

13.3 **ACA** to explore funding and training opportunities to establish a community-led local guide programme, offering guided heritage walks within Annbank and neighbouring villages to promote local history and attract visitors.

Long-term

13.4 **ACA** will commission a feasibility study to explore the development of a permanent Annbank Heritage and Visitor Centre, combining heritage interpretation and visitor facilities to create a sustainable destination.

13.4.1 Carry out comprehensive community engagement to ensure the project reflects local needs and aspirations.

13.4.2 Develop a high-quality exhibition space to preserve and showcase Annbank's industrial history, informed by the heritage audit (Action 12.2).

13.4.3 Explore integration of visitor accommodation (e.g. short-term lets or B&B units) to generate income and support long-term sustainability.

13.4.4 Position the centre as a key hub along the River Ayr Way, linking heritage with the wider tourism network.

13.4.5 Prioritise the reuse of existing buildings or brownfield sites, supporting sustainability and alignment with national environmental priorities.
