Report by Director of Education to Cabinet of 14 June 2022

Subject: Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Act 2021

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek agreement from the Cabinet to the South Ayrshire Period Products Delivery Statement.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet agrees the South Ayrshire Period Product Delivery Statement.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Act 2021 received Royal Assent on 12 January 2021. The Scottish Government advised local authorities on 2 March 2022 of their intention to bring the legal provisions into force on 15 August 2022. From this date local authorities will have a legal duty to make period products available for free for anyone who needs them, and in their role as education authorities, make period products available for free in schools. They are also required to publish a Statement on how they will exercise their functions under the Act.
- 3.2 South Ayrshire Council has been providing access to free period products since 2018/19. Products have been readily available within primary and secondary schools and the 'wee white bag' initiative is a widely promoted scheme allowing anyone who needs it to collect a bag of period products from a wide range of public buildings and from organisations working in partnership with the Council. The places where a bag can be picked up are advertised on the Council's website and social media channels:

Wee White Bag - South Ayrshire Council (south-ayrshire.gov.uk)

3.3 There is also an app – PickupmyPeriod that can be readily downloaded which shows nearby locations where products can be accessed. The locations are augmented as new organisations offer to make products available from their venue and the Council is responsive to feedback from the public. This is particularly relevant following COVID restrictions when some community venues were closed for a sustained period of time.

3.4 The wee white bag initiative has been very popular with 9,500 distributed since it launched in Summer 2019. A consultation was undertaken in March 2022 within schools and communities on the accessibility of period products to inform the South Ayrshire Council Delivery Statement. There were 423 responses to the public consultation and 242 responses to the school consultation.

4. Proposals

- 4.1 The Period Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Act 2021 and accompanying guidance is focussed on people in Scotland having 'reasonably convenient access to period products, free of charge, as and when they need it.' The key principles of the legislation are:
 - Products should be reasonably easy to access and the process should not be unduly complex or bureaucratic;
 - The approach taken should respect the dignity of individuals and places offering products should consider privacy and should make effort to minimise embarrassment. Individuals should not routinely have to ask for products or justify why they need them or the amount they require;
 - A reasonable choice of product should be offered although the full range of products need not be available from all venues;
 - Consideration can be given to making sustainable or plastic-free products available as part of the choice of products but pressure cannot be applied to get people to use reusable products;
 - The approach taken should be inclusive and recognise that not everyone requiring products will identify as female so some access in gender neutral and disabled toilets is appropriate.
- 4.2 The South Ayrshire Council Delivery Statement has been informed by the experience of making products accessible since 2018/19, by the results of the consultation undertaken within schools and communities and by the principles underpinning the legislation. The Delivery Statement is set out at Appendix 1. The accessibility of products is continually being refined especially in light of venues reopening following the easing of COVID restrictions. It is therefore proposed that an update will be provided to Elected Members via the Members' Bulletin one year following commencement of the Act.

5. Legal and Procurement Implications

- 5.1 This report ensures that the Council is complying with the requirements of the Period Products (Free Products) (Scotland) Act 2021 in terms of the accessibility of period products and the requirement to publish a Statement on how we will exercise our functions under the Act.
- 5.2 There are no procurement implications arising from this report. Collaborative work is undertaken with procurement to access period products at the most competitive rates.

6. Financial Implications

6.1 Financial support is provided by the Scottish Government for the provision of period products within the community and within schools. This is subject to annual

reporting on spend. The proposed delivery statement consolidates and strengthens access to period products within communities and schools but will be delivered within the Scottish Government financial envelope. No additional financial pressure on the Council budget is anticipated.

7. Human Resources Implications

7.1 Not applicable.

8. Risk

8.1 Risk Implications of Adopting the Recommendations

8.1.1 There are no risks associated with adopting the recommendations.

8.2 Risk Implications of Rejecting the Recommendations

8.2.1 The risk associated with rejecting the recommendations is that the Council is not considered to have complied with the requirements to publish a Statement on how it plans to exercise the functions required under the Act.

9. Equalities

9.1 The proposals in this report have been assessed through the Equality Impact Assessment Scoping process. There are no significant potential positive or negative equality impacts of agreeing the recommendations and therefore an Equalities Impact Assessment is not required. A copy of the Equalities Scoping Assessment is attached as Appendix 2.

10. Sustainable Development Implications

10.1 Considering Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) - This report does not propose or seek approval for a plan, policy, programme or strategy or document otherwise described which could be considered to constitute a plan, programme, policy or strategy. The Delivery Statement consolidates existing access arrangements rather than introducing new arrangements.

11. Options Appraisal

11.1 An options appraisal has not been carried out in relation to the subject matter of this report.

12. Link to Council Plan

12.1 The matters referred to in this report contribute to Commitments 2 and 3 of the Council Plan: Closing the Gap/ Reduce poverty and disadvantage; and Grow Well, Live Well, Age Well/ Health and care systems that meet people's needs.

13. Results of Consultation

13.1 Consultation has taken place with members of the public via an online survey and with both primary and secondary school pupils.

13.2 Consultation has taken place with Councillor Stephen Ferry, Portfolio Holder for Education, and Councillor Lee Lyons, Portfolio Holder for Health and Social Care, and the contents of this report reflects any feedback provided.

14. Next Steps for Decision Tracking Purposes

14.1 If the recommendations above are approved by Members, the Director of Education will ensure that all necessary steps are taken to ensure full implementation of the decision within the following timescales, with the completion status reported to the Cabinet in the 'Council and Cabinet Decision Log' at each of its meetings until such time as the decision is fully implemented:

Strategic Context

South Ayrshire Council has a vision of 'making a difference every day.' We recognise that easy access to free period products can make a difference to many people in our community and can support our strategic objectives of closing the gap and supporting people to grow well, live well and age well.

Current Arrangements

We have been providing access to a range of period products since 2018/19 through our schools, Council venues and community locations and our mission has been to do this in a way which makes products as reasonably accessible as possible and which reduces the embarrassment of those wanting to access products.

The South Ayrshire Council approach has been to make a range of products available including:

- Pads including with and without wings
- Tampons including with and without an applicator
- Panty liners
- Reusable pads
- Period pants (as part of an online pilot)
- Menstrual cup
- Wee white bag

Products are available from our schools and from Council buildings including swimming pools (including The Quay Zone) and activity centres, community centres, town and village halls and museums, libraries and mobile libraries, and public toilets. We have also trialled online ordering for reusable products. Products are also available at other local venues and information is readily available via the Council's website on where products can be accessed.

Information can also be accessed via the PickupmyPeriod app.

Consultation Results

We have recently consulted on the arrangements we have in place with communities via an online survey widely promoted through social media and community groups and parent groups and an online survey with school pupils. There were 423 respondents to the public consultation and 242 responses to the school consultation.

In terms of the public consultation, responses confirmed that people continue to want to access a range of products from a range of venues. There were suggestions for current venues to be augmented particularly in rural areas with hairdressers, petrol stations and garden centres referenced. An emphasis was placed on accessing products discreetly with most respondents suggesting the toilet area as the most suitable access point. There is demand for online ordering particularly from respondents in more rural areas and we will look to see if there is scope to strengthen online ordering arrangements linked to bulk buying as well as reusable products. Awareness of venues and products was reasonable but varied by location and by age group. We will work to maximise awareness of local arrangements.

In terms of the school consultation, there was good awareness of being able to access products and most participants thought these were easy to access. There was a suggestion about using health rooms for this and being able to leave the classroom readily to do so. Schools will continue to review local arrangements to make these responsive to feedback and in light of experience of young people accessing period products.

Proposed arrangements

In line with the Period Products (Free Products) (Scotland) Act 2021 and associated guidance and our practice to date, the arrangements to access period products will be underpinned by key principles as follows:

- Products will be reasonably easy to access from a range of venues;
- We will promote dignity in accessing products and seek wherever possible to attend to privacy considerations and make reasonable effort to minimise embarrassment;
- Individuals will not routinely have to ask for products or justify why they need them or the amount they require;
- It is recognised that people accessing products may be doing so on behalf of themselves or on behalf of other people;
- A reasonable choice of product will be offered;
- While we will promote reusable products, people will not be under pressure to opt for these;
- The approach taken will be inclusive and recognise that not everyone requiring products will identify as female;
- We will be open to suggestions to new venues and new approaches to accessing period products and will keep our arrangements under review.

The results of our consultation confirm that people in South Ayrshire continue to want a range of period products from a range of local venues including schools. We therefore propose to continue to make the following products available:

- Pads including with and without wings
- Tampons including with and without an applicator
- Panty liners
- Reusable pads
- Period pants
- Menstrual cup
- Wee white bag

We will make products available from our schools and from Council buildings including swimming pools (including The Quay Zone) and activity centres, community centres, town and village halls and museums, libraries and mobile libraries, and public toilets. We will continue to work with other local venues to increase local access and to promote information on venues where products can be accessed via the Council's website and the PickUpMyPeriod app. Due to their cost, reusable products will be available through a smaller number of locations. We will look to see how to strengthen online ordering arrangements for reusable products and bulk ordering.

Review Arrangements

South Ayrshire Council recognises that access arrangements are dynamic and evolve and grow as more local organisations opt to become involved and make products available from their venues and as we get feedback from those accessing products about their experience and suggestions on how to improve access. We will be open to new suggestions and will keep our arrangements under review and provide updates to our Delivery Statement periodically.

Subject: Ayr and Troon Cemetery Burial Chambers

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this briefing is to update Cabinet on the investigation into water ingress to the burial chambers at Ayr cemetery.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:
 - 2.1.1 notes the outcome of the investigation of water ingress within Ayr cemetery burial chambers; and
 - 2.1.2 approves the proposals outlined in section 4 and the cost and funding source of £1.500m set out in section 6.1.

3. Background

- 3.1 An investigation relating to water ingress within the burial chambers at Ayr cemetery extension was undertaken by an exhumation specialist consultant between 10th and 29th January 2022. The investigation was also supported by a Civil Engineering consultant to provide technical advice and materials testing.
- 3.2 It is evident from the initial findings that water was found in all chambers investigated, the likelihood is this will be the case for all occupied burial chambers. The investigation has identified that the water present in the chambers is likely to be surface and rainwater entering through the slats of the lower and upper chambers. We believe this will also be the case in Troon cemetery.
- 3.3 During April and May, tests were undertaken to ascertain the most appropriate method to prevent water ingress in future. These have now concluded with a bespoke, manufactured metal rain cover proving effective in preventing water entering the chambers tested. The test process is now progressing through technical sign off. Now that tests have been concluded the reports from the investigation will be finalised and signed off by all parties.
- 3.4 We appreciate this has been an extremely unsettling and distressing time for families and lair holders and hope to now be in a position to implement a solution that will go some way to providing reassurance around the way forward.

4. Proposals

- 4.1 Works to rectify the current situation will commence on 13 June 2022 with the first two weeks including time for families to discuss the process with the contractor if they have requested to do so. A full programme is currently being finalised, including an indicative timescale and completion date. Work at Troon cemetery will follow following completion at Ayr.
- 4.2 Officers have met with families during May to discuss the proposed process and give the opportunity for feedback, raise concerns as well as share personal requests and wishes. It is clear from these discussions that a number of families wish to hold a short ceremony as the deceased is re-interred within the burial chamber overseen by a local Funeral Director. We have asked the specialist contractor how we may be able to accommodate these wishes and we are currently finalising discussions with Funeral Directors. This will prove challenging and complex as given the nature of the work planned the cemetery extension will be classed as a construction site at this time and Construction, Design and Management (CDM) Health and Safety Regulations will apply. It is likely that this will also increase the period of time required to complete the full programme of work.
- 4.3 It is anticipated the contractor will work 6 days per week, and we would plan to open the cemetery extension again on the Sunday each week for visiting. We have had a number of requests from families who wish their loved one to be re-coffined in a coffin of their choice and this will also be included as part of the rectification process. The programme of work will require the Council to obtain the authority of the Sheriff Court, and further detail regarding this process is provided in the Legal Implications section below.
- 4.4 We have been able to reclaim an area within the old Ayr Cemetery that has allowed us to continue burials for the newly deceased in Ayr during this time. We have received some requests for loved ones to be placed in an earthen burial, however given the capacity constraints within the reclaimed area we would propose to accommodate this wish within Maybole, Monkton & Prestwick or Annbank cemeteries. However, if the number of requests for this are low, we may be able to accommodate within Ayr cemetery.
- 4.5 The last 6 months has required significant staff resource and it is anticipated dedicated resource will be required over the next 6 months to manage the programme effectively and provide the appropriate level of engagement with families and lair holders. Therefore, it is proposed to align the Coordinator (Grounds Maintenance and Bereavement) specifically to this work and backfill her post from the current team at a cost of around £30,000.
- 4.6 The Council has also engaged with Cruse Scotland, a specialist bereavement support organisation who have agreed to support families and lair holders as we work through the process of resolving the issue with the burial chambers. We understand that this has been an extremely unsettling and distressing time for families, and we hope this approach will provide additional independent support during this time. The form of support will be the choice of families themselves, with one-to-one support or potentially the formation of a support group.

5. Legal and Procurement Implications

5.1 In order to carry out the required exhumations, a legal process will be necessary to seek the authority of the Sheriff Court. This involves the lodging of a petition with

the Sheriff Court, which explains the circumstances and the need for the exhumations and is accompanied by a Feasibility Certificate signed by the Service Lead, Neighbourhood Services, and Forms of Consent signed by the relevant lair holders.

- 5.2 Previous experience of the Petition required in relation to Tarbolton cemetery indicates that the Sheriff Court were willing to deal with the matter in one Petition covering all the relevant lairs. It is hoped that this would be the case for the current matter in Ayr, and another for Troon in due course. Individual requests can also be made as required.
- 5.3 Legal advice is currently being considered to establish whether there are grounds for the Council to undertake legal action against the contractor(s) to recover all or any costs incurred by the Council.
- In terms of appointing a supplier to carry out this work there are no procurement frameworks available that cover this specialist requirement. Another option to appoint a supplier for this value of contract would be to run an open tender exercise which would take approximately 3/4 months to complete. However, this timescale would have a detrimental effect on the condition of the site(s) and work is required to start sooner (June 2022).
- 5.5 Given the nature and urgency of the requirement an appointment will be made under emergency conditions referencing clause 4.2.1 of the Councils standing orders relating to contracts.

6. Financial Implications

- At this point the Council will have to absorb all costs all costs of the rectification. There is currently £2,304,044 in the capital budget for cemetery infrastructure which will be utilised to fund the programme of work and associated costs. There is still scope to undertake urgent and structural work within this budget and other planned work will be re-profiled to future years. This may impact on future years and will require review as infrastructure investment is identified.
- 6.2 Initial indications are that the cost of the works required for Ayr Cemetery will be in the region of £1,500,000. Future costs are best estimates at this point in time and it is likely these will change as the programme of work is developed and rolled out. A full programme of works has yet to be established for Troon cemetery.

7. Human Resources Implications

7.1 It is proposed to align the Coordinator (Grounds Maintenance and Bereavement) specifically to this work and backfill her post from the current team at a cost of around £30,000.

8. Risk

8.1 Risk Implications of Adopting the Recommendations

8.1.1 The programme of work is still being finalised to accommodate families and lair holders wishes as far as possible. This may mean that the programme will take longer to complete, and the overall costs increase.

8.2 Risk Implications of Rejecting the Recommendations

8.2.1 If the recommendations are rejected, this is likely to impact on the reputation of the Council and cause additional distress to families and lair holders.

Subject: Housing Capital Programme 2021/22: Monitoring

Report as at 31 March 2022

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to update the Cabinet on the actual capital expenditure and income, together with progress made on the Housing Capital Programme projects as at 31 March 2022 (Period 12), and to agree the changes to budgets in 2022/23 and 2023/24.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:

- 2.1.1 notes the progress made on the delivery of the Housing Capital Programme to 31 March, resulting in spend of £23,232,748 or 97.21%, as detailed in Appendix 1 attached;
- 2.1.2 approves the adjustments contained in Appendix 2 attached; and
- 2.1.3 approves the revised budget for 2022/23 at £69,204,500 and 2023/24 at £40,184,366 as highlighted in Appendix 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Housing Capital Programme for 2021/22 to 2025/26 was approved by South Ayrshire Council on 20 January 2021.
- 3.2 The Housing Capital Programme for 2022/23 to 2026/27 was approved by South Ayrshire Council of 3 March, 2022 through the paper 'Housing Revenue Account (HRA) Revenue Budget 2022/23 and Capital Budget 2022/23 to 2026/27' and incorporated all adjustments made to the Programme throughout 2021/22.
- The current approved budget as agreed by Leadership Panel of 15 February, 2022 is £23,898,683.

4. Proposals

4.1 The total spend on the Housing Capital Programme during financial year 2021/22 of £23,232,748 was significantly higher than the total spend in the previous year of £17,504,091. This is due to the gradual easing of Covid Restrictions and internal works have been able to be progressed.

- 4.2 The first modernisation contract for 2021/22 (H20123: Internal Modernisation Works to 160 Nr Properties in Ayr and Maybole) completed on site in December. The second modernisation contract (H21124: Internal Modernisation Works to 219 Nr Properties Various Locations) started on site on 0 January, 2022 with works progressing well and the project is planned to complete on 15 June, 2022. The third contract (H20126 Internal Modernisation Works to 263 Nr Properties Various Locations) has now been let and works are programmed to start on site on 30 May, with an estimated completion date of 30 September. The final contract (H20125: Internal Modernisation Works to 206Nr Properties Various Locations) will be tendered will be tendered through SAC's new Housing Refurbishment Framework Internal once this has been set up.
- 4.3 Address lists for two modernisation contracts for 2022/23 have been passed to the Managing Agent for initial survey works and these are ongoing.
- 4.4 Annual programmes for Addressing Dampness and Condensation, Central Heating Replacement and Capital Element of Works Undertaken in Void Properties have been completed and new programmes will be established for 2022/23.
- 4.5 For works contained within the Structural and Environmental section of the programme, the two external fabric upgrade projects which were carried forward from the previous year and delayed due to Covid have now completed. The major contract for this year, now External Fabric Upgrades to 167 Properties Various Locations (H22112) has now been let and a pre-start meeting is being arranged which will inform the programme of work
- 4.6 The main window renewals contract for 2021/22 is still on site with 229 properties completed by 31 March. The remaining properties are being worked on currently as there have been delays in receiving the windows from the manufacturer.
- 4.7 The contract for the Supply/ Installation of Eurobin Corrals Various Locations is on site and will now complete in July 2022.
- 4.8 Colleagues from Housing and Professional Design Services have met to agree projects to be undertaken during 2022/23 and the budget allocations required for specific projects/ programmes from unallocated budgets contained within the programme in this year. These adjustments have been requested through the P12 report.
- 4.9 Works are being undertaken to allow for the re-tendering of the Housing Refurbishment Framework Internal and the Housing Refurbishment Framework External.
- 4.10 The project information contained in Appendix 1 has been broken down over the Council wards and a document showing this has been made available to Members in the Members' area (Hub) on Re-Wired (see background papers).
- 4.11 Appendix 2 details budget adjustments being put forward for approval by Cabinet as part of the Period 12 report. These adjustments include (a) internal re-allocations of budgets between projects in 2021/22; (b) transfers of budgets from 2021/22 to 2022/23 to reflect current profiled spend for projects; (c) transfers where budget is being advanced from 2022/23 and 2023/24 to 2021/22 to reflect the current profiled spend for projects; and (d) allocation of 2022/23 unallocated budgets to specific projects / programmes in this year.

4.12 As previously reported, disruption continues to supply chains and labour due to Covid-19 and the UK's exit from the EU.

Subject: The South Ayrshire Way Strategic Change Programme

- Preparing for the Future

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide an update to the Cabinet on progress delivering the *South Ayrshire Way Strategic Change Programme* including detail on projected benefits for projects.

2. Recommendation

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:
 - 2.1.1 notes the progress made by officers in completing relevant actions and recommendations in the Best Value Audit;
 - 2.1.2 notes the benefits and productivity gains proposed by current projects on the programme; and
 - 2.1.3 agrees a further update to the Service and Performance Panel in October 2022 in line with agreed reporting arrangements.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Leadership Panel in November 2020 made a commitment to delivering a 10-year programme of transformational change and the establishment of the 'South Ayrshire Way Strategic Change Programme' for 2020-30.
- 3.2 The overarching high-level themes of the programme are:
 - 3.2.1 **Delivering Council Plan priorities** focusing our services and expenditure on activities that support the Council Plan priorities.
 - 3.2.2 **Services which are designed to be fit for purpose and sustainable** ensuring that we carry out systemic and structural reviews of our services which will seek to identify opportunities for transformational change through improvement, flexibility and integration.
 - 3.2.3 **Customers at the heart of what we do** Ensuring that the quality of services and the customer experience is the best that it can be, while encouraging and supporting customers to be more flexible and to work with us to deliver sustainable services.

- 3.2.4 **Digitally confident** doing more online and being more efficient in our processes.
- 3.2.5 **Maximising the use of our assets** working with communities to support them to make best use of their local assets.
- 3.2.6 **A workforce for the future** ensuring an engaged, empowered and informed workforce with the skills necessary to deliver the Council priorities.
- 3.3 Three temporary officers joined the Council in June 2021 as the Strategic Change Programme Office (1 x Co-ordinator, 2 x Project Officers) and commenced setting up the programme, implementing governance, developing communication and benefits plans and starting to scope out projects.
- In March 2022, as part of the Council's budget setting process, the three temporary project posts were made permanent and there was agreement to add two new permanent project officer posts. This acknowledged the Councils 10 year commitment to delivering a programme of change, enables the expansion of the programme, accelerates business change and helps to better support the overall transformation aspirations of the Council.
- 3.5 The three temporary officers were successful at interview and are now permanent. The additional two new permanent project officers are expected to start in June 2022.
- 3.6 As the programme progresses, more projects have moved into delivery. There are currently 23 projects on the Programme; 18 projects at implementation stage; 4 are in planning and 1 project has completed and moved into benefits realisation.
- 3.7 Additional projects have been identified and will be reviewed for inclusion in line with governance arrangements and pending resource availability:
 - Economy and Regeneration Service Review;
 - Gas Central Heating In-House Provision;
 - Building Base Services;
 - Team around the Locality; and
 - Process improvements across a range of services.
- 3.8 In terms of the Best Value Audit of the Council, undertaken by the Audit Commission in 2021 and specific recommendations related to the Change programme: 'The Council should make sure that its transformation work is fully aligned and integrated to its covid recovery planning work and improve its approach to its Strategic Change Programme.'; the actions relevant to the Change Programme are all complete. The Council has added additional success indicators as part of the Best Value Action Plan and these can be found at Appendix 1.
- 3.9 The Benefits Realisation Plan and 4 stage Benefits Management Process has been implemented and applied to each project. <u>Table 1</u> in <u>Appendix 2</u> shows the number of projects at each stage of the benefits process. <u>Table 2</u> in <u>Appendix 2</u> provides a summary of approved benefits for each of the projects on the Programme.

- 3.10 As projects progress through their implementation it is possible that additional 'value add' benefits are identified as new information and impacts are known. These will also be captured in benefit trackers.
- 3.11 Some projects have been identified as delivering Productivity Gains (where changes or outcomes delivered by projects result in improved efficiency of workers in performing tasks).
- 3.12 Examples include where a project could introduce new technology, processes or streamline ways of working which lead to improvements in how a service or process is delivered, such as moving from manual or paper-based processes to digital.
- 3.13 Engagement with the Improvement Service and other local authorities informs and validates South Ayrshire Council's approach to measuring and evidencing productivity. Internal engagement across services, with Human Resources, staff and Trade Unions will continue as we develop our approach to managing productivity gains.
- 3.14 We will further explore the potential for task re-assignment across services and teams; the allocation of additional work; reviewing role requirements; retraining or redeployment; and where there may be a requirement to make service changes, in line with the Council's *Managing Workforce Change* policy.

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide an update on the progress of the 'Scotland Loves Local' Gift Card Scheme and to seek approval to continue with the programme for another year based on the costs provided in this report.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:

- 2.1.1 notes the benefits of the 'Scotland Loves Local' Gift Card Scheme for local residents, businesses and the Council;
- 2.1.2 approves continuation of the scheme for 1 year from 31 August 2022 based on costs provided within paragraph 6.1 of this report; and
- 2.1.3 agrees any continuation of the scheme past June 2023 is subject to further approvals

3. Background

- 3.1 The 'Scotland Loves Local' campaign is a national initiative supported by the Scottish Government and Scotland's Towns Partnership (STP), designed to encourage all those who live in Scotland to think local first and support their town centres and high streets.
- 3.2 The concordat between South Ayrshire Council and STP to participate in the Scotland Loves Local Gift Card initiative was signed by South Ayrshire Council on 31 August 2021. The initiative is recognised as one that promotes the principles of Community Wealth Building ie a people centred approach to local economic sustainability and growth.
- 3.3 Local businesses participating in the gift card initiative have the potential to unlock a new level of local spending which is important as businesses recover from the impact of the pandemic and build for a future that has localism at its heart.
- 3.4 The gift card is free for every business across Scotland to accept and uses the MasterCard network, so any business with a card reader can sign up. The gift card can be used in any type of business, and online or offline so long as the merchant has a 'bricks and mortar' presence in the area.

- 3.5 Funding to administer the scheme in year 1 (August 2021 to August 2022) was provided by the Scottish Government. There is a £600 (plus VAT) monthly fee requirement to further operate the scheme past 31 August 2022 (covering fulfilment, e-commerce, platform access/ data access, licence and management fee and participation). A three-month notice to quit the scheme is required if the Council does not wish to participate in the scheme after Year 1.
- 3.6 Scotland Towns Partnerships have confirmed that no decision has been made as yet by Scottish Government, on whether any further funding will be available to Local Authorities post 1 September 2022 to subsidise the scheme.
- 3.7 As of 20 April 2022, 113 businesses across South Ayrshire have registered to participate in the scheme.
- 3.8 196 South Ayrshire gift cards have been purchased via the Scotland Loves Local website since the consumer campaign started at the end of November 2021. The total value of gift cards purchased via the Scotland Loves Local website is £9,640.00, with an average gift card purchase of £49.18. There are approximately 4,800 gift cards remaining for purchase, funded
- 3.9 The Economy and Regeneration service continue to target businesses that have the potential to benefit from the aforementioned campaigns for example, hotels, restaurants, cafes, bars, cultural and heritage sites, town centre shops, coastal experiences.
- 3.10 Discussions are taking place with the gift card provider on how identified national chain stores in targeted areas could be onboarded to ensure a better balance of food and convenience stores in Maybole, Girvan and surrounding areas.
- 3.11 Opportunities are being investigated to utilise the gift card for corporate rewards and recognition/incentives by South Ayrshire Anchor Institutions. This would further support the retention of local spending, support the local economy, and encourage staff from anchor institutions to engage with South Ayrshire businesses, towns and high streets.

4. Proposals

- 4.1 There is a £600 (excluding VAT) monthly fee requirement to further operate the scheme (covering fulfilment, e-commerce, platform access/ data access, licence and management fee and participation) once the funded pilot period has ended.
- 4.2 Anticipated operational costs from the card provider for continued participation in the scheme are provided below:
 - Financial Year 2022/2023 (Sep 22 end Mar 23) £4,200.00 (excluding VAT);
 - Financial Year 2023/2024 (April 23 end Mar 24) £7,200.00 (excluding VAT); and
 - Financial Year 2024/2025 (April 24 end Mar 25) £7,200.00 (excluding VAT).

- In addition, the production cost for a minimum quantity of 5,000 South Ayrshire Gift Cards is £3,000.00 (excluding VAT). Anticipated additional supplies of cards for April 23-24 and April 24-25 will add an additional £3,000.00 to each year.
- 4.4 In order for the Scotland Loves Local Gift Card scheme to continue past the Scottish Government funded pilot period, it is proposed that Cabinet approves budget to operate for another year to August 2023, based on costs provided within this report, with funding available through the Economy and Regeneration budget.
- 4.5 Should central funding from the Scottish Government become available, there would be no requirement to make funding available from the Councils budget.
- 4.6 A further update will be provided on the Gift Card scheme in May 2023 to coincide with the notice to guit period.

5. Legal and Procurement Implications

- 5.1 There will be a requirement to serve notice in terms of the arrangement In June 2023 and the service will co-ordinate with the legal department the notice that needs served where required.
- 5.2 There are no procurement implications arising from this report.

6.1 To continue with the Gift Card scheme from September 2022 until March 2023, financial resource, aligned to the Economy and Regeneration service budget (from underspend in the 2021/22 budget) is required as follows:

Subject: Annex 2 Contract Awards in Q3 and Q4 2021/22

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to advise the Cabinet, in accordance with Clause C.6 of Annex 2 of <u>Standing Orders Relating to Contracts</u>, of contracts directly awarded under South Ayrshire Council's Annex 2 arrangements during 1 October 2021 to 31 March 2022.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet considers the detail listed at Appendix 1, of directly awarded contracts to service providers, using the provisions of Annex 2 of Standing Orders relating to Contracts.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Council's Standing Orders Relating to Contracts, at Annex 2, indicate circumstances where an Executive Officer may, without prior advertisement or competition, enter negotiations with one or more providers to develop contracts relating to health or social care services.
- 3.2 Services procured using the provisions of Annex 2 of Standing Orders Relating to Contracts reflect the principles set down in the Statutory Guidance issued by Scottish Ministers in terms of the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 as well as the Best Practice Guidance on the Procurement of Care and Support Services 2016, the 'Light Touch Regime,' issued in terms of the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act. Procured services are defined by Common Procurement Vocabulary (CPV) codes covered under the Light Touch Regime.
- 3.3 Where there are special circumstances justifying a departure from advertisement or competition, the Executive Officer should provide the Cabinet with a list of such contracts, in accordance with Standing Orders Relating to Contracts, Annex 2, Clause C.6.
- 3.4 Special circumstances include (but are not limited to) for example; where EU Treaty principles around advertisement and competition do not apply; where service user(s) needs are best met by a particular provider; where particular provision of social care is limited due to geographic location or particular skills; or the existing service provider(s) are the only provider(s) capable of delivering the service to meet the needs of the individual(s) concerned.

- 3.5 Where there is a requirement to enter into a contract with a service provider, using the provisions of Annex 2 of Standing Orders Relating to Contracts, approval is first required by the relevant Executive Officer along with a Service Finance Team Coordinator and the Service Lead Procurement.
- 3.6 Appointments then made under Annex 2 of Standing Orders Relating to Contracts are concluded following a robust process, using the Council's contract terms and conditions, the completion of a contract strategy and contract document. The contract document sets out the outcomes required for the service user against similar, national services and are assessed, financially, against Local Government Benchmarking Framework Data from Comparator Councils to ensure that Best Value is achieved.
- 3.7 Any decisions taken under paragraphs C.2, C.3, C.4 or C.5 of Annex 2 of Standing Orders Relating to Contracts, that neither advertising nor competition will be required for a particular contract, shall be subject to review by the Executive Officer at regular intervals (and at least annually).

4. Proposals

- 4.1 Members of the Cabinet are requested to consider the award of contracts, during October 2021 to March 2022, under Annex 2 of the Council's with Standing Orders Relating to Contracts, as detailed at Appendix 1.
- 4.2 Column B of Appendix 1 details the name of the Directorate of the Contract Owner.

Subject: Services to Gypsy/ Travellers – Site to Support and Accommodate Gypsy/ Traveller Encampments

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide Cabinet with an update on the consultation and feasibility study undertaken on the preferred location of a potential transit site for Gypsy/ Traveller encampments in South Ayrshire.
- 2. Recommendation
- 2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:
 - 2.1.1 considers the consultation response as outlined in section 4;
 - 2.1.2 considers the feasibility study and confirm the preferred site within Cockhill Farm:
 - 2.1.3 requests officers to finalise site design incorporating feedback from the Gypsy/ Traveller community and report back to Cabinet in September; and
 - 2.1.4 notes the approach from a local landowner and confirms if they wish to pursue further discussion on the proposal.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Leadership Panel of 15 June 2021 considered and approved the report entitled 'Services to Gypsy/ Travelers – Update from Member/ Officer Working Group and Proposed Future Actions'.
- 3.2 It was agreed that the Member/ Officer Working Group (MOWG) should work to identify and consider potentially suitable sites to provide a designated area to support and accommodate Gypsy/ Traveller encampments in South Ayrshire, and bring proposals to a future meeting of the Leadership Panel.
- 3.3 In 2019, the Scottish Government and Convention of Scottish Local Authorities (COSLA) published a joint action plan entitled 'Improving the Lives of Scotland's Gypsy/ Travellers (2019–2021)'. One of the key areas within the plan is to provide more and better accommodation.

- 3.4 The MOWG Group has acknowledged that existing provision for settled travellers at Houdston Reid-Lea, Girvan is sufficient to meet demand. However, one of the immediate 'gaps' in provision, is around the availability of a designated area to support and accommodate Gypsy/ Traveller encampments that occur in South Ayrshire. As part of the process in managing unauthorised encampments, dialogue has taken place with Gypsy/ Travellers, who have indicated that a site within Ayr or Prestwick or around the outskirts of these areas would be favourable.
- 3.5 Through the process of identifying potentially suitable sites to offer a 'negotiated stopping approach or a more formal transit site provision, contact has been made with the landowners/ agents of Bargany Estate and Cassillis Estate. Both have confirmed that they do not have any land holdings suitable and appropriate for this purpose. In addition, enquiries were made with the National Farmers Union on potential sites within the local farming community, however they have also advised that no suitable land is available. An enquiry was also made to a landowner at Mosshill Industrial Estate, who has confirmed that the land is not available for sale. A number of private landowners have also been contacted as part of the process.
- The MOWG has reported back to Leadership Panel on a number of occasions with the last on 8 March 2022 where Panel approved the development of a Transit site at the preferred location of Cockhill Farm. Panel also requested officers to undertake consultation with the local community and the Gypsy/ Traveller community on the proposed location and site layout and carry out full design and feasibility study for the preferred location.

4. Proposals

- 4.1 Over April and early May the general public were given the opportunity to feedback on the potential use of an area within Cockhill Farm as a Gypsy/ Traveller Transit site. During this time we received a total of 34 responses, of which 3 were positive, 27 were negative and 4 were enquiries. The negative responses related to the potential location; cost of the proposal; loss of habitat; lack of access to amenities.
- 4.2 Officers have also met with members of the Gypsy/ Traveller community to discuss the proposal and give the opportunity to provide feedback. This included residents of the Council's permanent site at Houdston-Reid Lea and a number of families who regularly camp in South Ayrshire. Feedback was supportive of the proposed location and families also stated that they would use the site. They also provided more detailed feedback on a site lay out and facilities that will now be considered further to develop a new site plan.
- 4.3 A full design and feasibility study has also been undertaken. Specialist consultants were appointed to evaluate the land and assess its suitability for development of the proposals and specifically to comment on any potential constraints associated with the proposed Travellers Site development at Cockhill Fam.
- 4.4 Two potential sites have been identified: site 1 is south of Cockhill Farm and site 2 is east of the farm. Feasibility & Constraints reports for both sites, including site plans, are included within Appendices 1 and 2. Both sites are positioned close to established tree lines to provide screening and privacy, they are distant from a private property and both can be accessed from the existing road into the site.
- 4.5 The detailed feedback received from the Gypsy/ Traveller community will now be considered to ensure an inclusive design development that aligns with their cultural traditions. Safety and security will be a key consideration in the detailed design

phase with the access, siting and screening of the development to ensure people feel safe and secure in their homes.

- 4.6 Adaptable and flexible arrangements will be a consideration as part of the proposals which will allow extended families to live together, grow and change over time. All the facilities provided will be accessible to ensure people with a disability or older people can stay on site.
- 4.7 Generally, the following accommodation and facilities will be provided, this list is not exhaustive and will be developed following the consultation mentioned above:-
 - Pitches for caravans or motorhomes and cars. Each pitch will have an electrical supply and drainage connection. The pitches will be designed to ensure compliance with the Building Regulations and Fire Safety Regulations;
 - Paved, hardstanding site with good access link to main road (A713);
 - Washroom facilities including showers and WC's with direct access which can be allocated to each pitch (if wished);
 - Laundry facility;
 - Bin store;
 - Drying area;
 - Recreational space; and
 - Renewable technologies to ensure the site is as low carbon as possible.
- 4.8 The estimated capital cost relating to the provision of a transit site will be in the region of £900,000. The proposed site is owned by the Council and the potential development sites are located close to the existing access road to avoid the expense of a new road junction. Mains services are available in the vicinity of the sites which will keep infrastructure costs to a minimum. The site layout/configuration will be as economical as possible in terms of space planning.
- 4.9 Given the information presented, site 2 offers better development potential for a number of reasons: good screening is provided by the existing treeline, it is further from the Equitation Centre than Site 1, there is better flexibility with the site layout as Site 1 is constrained by high voltage electrical cables and it is closer to the access road. The next stage of the development process will include consideration of Planning consent. The land forms part of a wider Local Development Plan land allocation to create a long-term urban/ settlement expansion area for Ayr, however there remains a requirement for the site to gain planning permission for the specific use.
- 4.10 During the consultation period, the Council was approached by a local farmer who has offered to have discussions on using an area within his landholding for a Gypsy/ Traveller Transit site. The area itself is close by Cockhill Farm but on the other side of the A713. Members are asked to consider whether they wish officers to continue discussions on this offer and bring back further information to the MOWG at the same time as finalising the proposal at Cockhill Farm.
- 4.11 Leadership Panel and the MOWG have previously agreed that officers should apply to the Gypsy Traveller Accommodation Fund offered by the Scottish Government. Stage 1 for the fund closed on 16 May and officers have submitted a proposal in line with the feasibility and design work undertaken to date. If the proposal is

shortlisted for Stage 2 later in the summer, more detail will be required as well as a formal presentation to the Scottish Government. As highlighted previously, the fund will cover up to 60% of any project and the Council will be required to make up the shortfall. For the proposal to be successful we would require to formally agree the source of the funding and it is proposed to allocate a sum of £500,000 to the capital programme for this purpose.

5. Legal and Procurement Implications

- 5.1 There are no legal implications arising from this report.
- 5.2 There are no procurement implications arising from this report.

6. Financial Implications

- 6.1 The estimated capital cost relating to the provision of a transit/ temporary stopping site is in the region of £900,000. Scottish Government grant funding is available up to 60% of project costs; however, any shortfall will be required to be met by the Council. It is proposed to allocate £500,000 in the capital programme for this purpose. This will require a review of the Capital Programme to accommodate this. Revenue costs will be established once full design and feasibility study has been completed and an appropriate revenue budget will require to be identified.
- 6.2 Feedback from the Scottish Government on the Stage 1 bid for grant funding is expected by September 2022. If the Council is unsuccessful there may be an opportunity to apply in the next round of funding in 2023. At that point the Council will have to decide whether to self-fund the whole project or pause the project until the future grant funding becomes available.

7. Human Resources Implications

7.1 Not applicable.

8. Risk

8.1 Risk Implications of Adopting the Recommendations

- 8.1.1 Although the preferred site has been identified, there is a risk that further site investigations or considerations may impact on its ultimate suitability. In addition, the information contained in previous reports is based on unauthorised encampment activity since 2019. Proposals outlines in this paper are based on the travel pattern and recurring encampments of the current Gypsy/ Travelling community. If this were to change, it should be acknowledged that this may well impact on the needs and demand for site provision in the future.
- 8.1.2 It should also be noted that the provision of a designated area of land for negotiated stopping or transit/ temporary stopping site provision may not entirely provide a solution to, or prevent, future unauthorised encampments.

8.2 Risk Implications of Rejecting the Recommendations

8.2.1 If the recommendations are rejected, this is likely to impact on the Council's pace of progress to improve experiences and outcomes for Gypsy/ Travellers.

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1.0 Introduction:

1.1 Brief

We have been requested by South Ayrshire Council, to compile a Feasibility report for a greenfield land parcel south of Cockhill Farm, Ayr, KA6 6AH. This land parcel is known as Site 1.

We were asked specifically to comment on any potential constraints associated with the proposed Travellers Site development. We have completed a desk top survey as part of this report. A follow up site visit was carried out on Monday 28th March 2022.

1.2 <u>Limitations</u>

This report is made out on the instructions of, and on behalf of South Ayrshire Council. No responsibility is accepted to any third party for the whole or any part of its contents.

Neither the whole nor any part of this report, nor any reference thereto may be included in any document, circular or statement without the written approval of this firm as to the form and context in which it will appear prior to any agreed disclosure.

No excavations have been carried out to expose the depth, nature, and condition of the subsoils to determine its load bearing ability.

Our report is restricted to the terms of our brief. Where comments are made on other aspects or areas of the land, these comments are made for information purposes. No reliance can be made on these additional comments.

No tests have been carried out on materials for strength and no drilling has been executed to determine the grades, thickness, or composition of any materials, other than noted above. We did not undertake tests in respect to deleterious materials and no assurances can be giving to the presence of such materials.

No borescope examinations have been carried out and it was not possible to inspect parts of any structures that were covered. Our inspection was limited to a survey from ground level only.

Our Engineers are not qualified to carry out inspections, or tests on specialist services and as such, none have been undertaken during the inspection. Without prejudice to the foregoing generality, such services extend to include electrical, heating, and ventilating services installations and any similar specialist services.

The general description of the property is provided for information purposes and is based on background information combined with our opinion and experience of similar buildings. This

2.0 Site Location

The 0.53 Ha development parcel is a greenfield site located to the South of Cockhill Farm, Ayr, KA6 6AH. The proposed development site is generally open farmland/fields.

- Access is gained to the site via the Farm road/track off the A713 on the north boundary
- The postal address for the nearest site is Woodlea House, KA6 6AH
- The site is centred on approximately OS Grid Ref. NS368175 / NS3684217565
- OS Grid Coordinates are approximately Eastings = 236842, Northings = 617565

The site is bounded by:

- To the North Cockhill Wood & Woodlea House
- To the East A713 Main Road and Mosshill Industrial Estate
- To the South Ayrshire Equitation Centre
- To the West Tree Belt and open Farmland/fields




Figure 1 – Location Plan (1:25K)

We have appended the Architects proposal for the site in Appendix A. We have appended a number of photographs taken during our site visit on 28th March 2022 in Appendix B.



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3.0 <u>Site Access/Egress</u>

The current development Plan shows one access to the site highlighted below. It is proposed to access the site via the existing access road located off the main A713 road. This access point will require to be discussed and approved by South Ayrshire Council during the Planning and Roads Construction Consent stages. We have no South Ayrshire Council Roads Adoption Plans for the site. However, it is thought unlikely that the Farm access track is an adoptable road leading up to the entrance to the site.

It is thought unlikely that it will be requested from SAC that two points of access is provided for the development. Further consultation is required in this regard.

4.0 Topography

Topography varies across the site with the high ground generally located to the North/North East boundary (105m -109mAOD) and falling towards the lowest point at the South-West boundary (95mAoD). This equates to an existing longitudinal fall of approximately 1 in 10.

The existing spot levels at the four corners of the site are as follows:

- South-East 100m AoD
- South-West 95m AoD
- North-East 102m AoD
- North-West 107m AoD

Consideration should be given to the existing site topography during development of Architectural Layouts to ensure proposed layouts work with site levels. Our site visit noted that the tree belt along the northern/eastern boundary was at a higher level than the rest of the existing site with levels generally falling southwards. This will require consideration for the proposed access road.




Figure 3 – Location Plan showing OS Map contours

We have still to undertake a topographical survey from the site. However, we approached 3 Topographical Survey Consultants to provide quotations for the works. A tender analysis report was produced providing recommendations.

5.0 <u>Historic Site Use</u>

A review of the historic site maps was carried out for the following dates: 1863, 1897, 1905, 1955 and 1957. The historic maps have indicated the site has always been a greenfield land parcel/open countryside or forestry.

6.0 Archaeology

We are not aware of any archaeology report being carried out for the site. Therefore, we have no evidence of archaeologically significant features at or near the site. The West of Scotland Archaeology Free Online Resources Service has highlighted the following features near our site. This relates to a Designed Landscape located to the west of Cockhill Farm. We have appended the information in Appendix C.




Figure 4 – Extract from West of Scotland Archaeology Online Resources Service

A review of the available on-line free resources from the British Geological Survey (BGS) was undertaken. An extract is shown below.




Figure 5 – Extract from BGS Geoindex Viewer

8.0 Mineral/Geotechnical

No site investigations to date have been carried out for the existing site. A review of historical borehole records was carried out from online geological mapping to gain an understanding of the substrata. The BGS generally reports the ground conditions as —

9.0 Mining

The site lies within the Coal Authority defined Coal Mining Reporting Area and Surface Coal Resource Area and a detailed report should be carried out by a Geo-Environmental Consultant. The Coal Authority Interactive UK Mapping Service has indicated no workings (Past, Present or Shallow) are recorded within the site or its surroundings. No mine entries or abandoned mines are noted.




Figure 6 – Extract from Coal Mining Authority Interactive Map Viewer



10.0 Gas/ Environment

No site investigation works have been carried out to determine the exact gassing requirement for the site. A review of the UK Radon Mapping has highlighted the site is within the lowest band for radon with a maximum radon potential of less than 1%. This site has been identified as being within a low probability radon area and it is likely that no preclusion measures are required for this Gas. However, detailed investigations should be undertaken to confirm.




Figure 7 – Extract from Radon Interactive Map Viewer

11.0 Contamination/Sulphates

Given the site has been undeveloped over the years and remained a greenfield site, it is unlikely there will be many risk sources of contamination to the land. However, a detailed site investigation should be carried out to confirm presence of any potential contamination within the land.

12.0 Ecology

No ecology report has been prepared for the development.

There appears to be open countryside and tree belt within the site and a habitat/ecological survey should be carried out the confirm the presence of any protected species. This is likely to be required for Planning purposes.



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13.0 Arboriculture

It should be noted that there appears to be a significant tree line running along the east and south site boundaries. A tree survey may be required should any of the trees be removed. Again, this is likely to be required for Planning purposes.

No invasive plant survey has been carried out to confirm the presence of any problematic species on site such Japanese Knotweed, Himalayan Balsam etc. This could be carried out during the Site Investigation works or by an independent Arboriculturist report.

14.0 <u>Drainage</u>

14.1 Existing Surface Water Drainage

Scottish Water records show there is currently no Surface Water infrastructure within the site, which is in keeping with the previous agricultural land use. However, it should be noted that it may be possible that land drainage exists within the site which will be encountered and disturbed during the proposed development works. There is likely to be a series of field drains within the site development to encourage irrigation and drainage at the site.

The records show Issues on the southern boundary. We noted during our site visit that there is a small watercourse within the wooded area on the southern boundary. We could not determine the extents of this watercourse.

14.2 Proposed Surface Water Drainage

The surface water drainage will incorporate traditional road gullies or SUDS system that connects into an end of line SUDS feature such as a porous paving or a conveyance Swale. The outfall from the SUDS features will connect into the existing issues or minor watercourse along the southern boundary.

It would be prudent to ensure that there is provision for a surface water connection from the development and approval must be sought from Scottish Water and the relevant Statutory Authorities.

We have not carried out any calculations to show the size of the SUDS scheme.

However it is likely that SUDS feature will incorporate a minimum attenuation and storage volume for the 1 in 30-year event + 40% Climate Change.

This will include a 1 in 200year flooding design check.

The size and layout of the SUDS feature will be confirmed during detailed design.

The Greenfield run off rate will require to be calculated for the SUDS features. This will be the controlling discharge for the proposed development. This will require to be agreed with South Ayrshire Council and Scottish Water.



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It should be noted that the South Ayrshire Council Local Authority Flooding Department will request the SUDS feature sized to allow for temporary storage during the 1 in 30/200-year storm events. Enquiries with the relevant parties should be made early in the development process to ensure agreement is reached between Scottish Water and the Local Authority regarding any adoption agreement.

It is also likely that Scottish Water will require a CCTV prior to connection approvals.

14.3 Existing Foul Water Drainage:

Scottish Water records show there is currently no Foul Water infrastructure within the site, which is in keeping with the previous agricultural land use. We are unsure at present of foul water drainage for Cockhill Farm, and Woodlea house. It is thought likely that a septic tank is used at these locations.

Scottish Water records indicate foul/combined sewers in the Industrial estate to the east. They appear to head in a northern direction before heading westwards to the north of Cockhill Farm and Woodlea House.

A Pre-Development Enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm capacity of the local Wastewater network prior to detailed design.

14.4 Proposed Water Supply Pipes

Water supply pipes are noted to run in the main A713 Road. The service plans show Cockhill Farm and Woodlea are served by water supply pipes in the access road leading to the properties.

Water supply pipework will require a UKWIR Assessment along the proposed water supply route associated with any new development. This will be carried out as part of the site investigation works.

A Pre-development enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm the network can supply the proposed development.

We have appended the Drainage Service Plans in Appendix E.

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15.0 Roads

Finalised road construction will be verified following the provision of CBR testing at 25m centres on the underlying strata along the proposed road length. A selection of initial CBR testing should be undertaken as part of the site investigation works to gain an insight into the underlying strata. If the access road is to remain private, this requirement would not be so onerous.

Our site visit noted that the tree belt is at a higher level than the rest of the site with levels generally falling southwards. New access roads will require to form the development with gradients no steeper than 1 in 13 or 15. A topographic survey will be required to confirm suitable design levels for the roads and development.

At this stage, it should be assumed that any adopted roads would require a full road box construction.

16.0 Flooding

A review of the SEPA Flood maps confirms that the site is not at risk of flooding from Rivers, Coastal or Surface Water. See attached extract below. There appears to be a low to medium likelihood of surface water flooding along the southern boundary of the site. This is noted in the area of the Cottage and Ayrshire Equitation Centre.

It is likely that South Ayrshire Council will request a detailed Flood Risk Assessment should be carried out for the development during the Pre-Planning Enquiry.




Figure 8 – Extract from SEPA Flood Maps

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17.0 Existing Services

In addition to the existing drainage services discussed in sections 14.2 and 14.3, the following utilities infrastructure is located within the vicinity of the site:

17.1 Water:

Scottish Water records show that there is a 150mm – 200mm Diameter in the grass verge within the main A713 Road. There is also a 90mm HPPE Water supply pipe located within the access road leading to Cockhill Farm. This heads past Cockhill Farm before heading southwards towards the Ayrshire Equitation Centre. A 2" Cast iron pipe is also noted to head north after Cockhill Farm. A Pre-Development Enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm the proposed development can be supplied.

17.2 Gas:

SGN utility plans show that there are no services present within our site. Enquiries should be to be made to SGN to ensure sufficient capacity is available to service the proposed development if required.

17.3 Electricity:

Scottish Power Energy Network location plans show there are overhead 11kV HV cables and associated poles running along the centre of our site. This is likely to be one of the biggest constraints to the development. We are awaiting SPEN feedback regarding safe distances.

Diversion works will be required for the overhead HV cables. Enquiries should be made to SPEN to discuss re-routing works and associated wayleaves required.




Figure 9 – Extract from SPEN Services plans – cables noted from Cockhil Farm and Woodlea




Figure 10 – Extract from SPEN Services Plans – underground and overground Cables noted within site

The above extract shows 95mm AL HV underground cables in the main A713 Road. This enters our site boundary next to the existing fence/gate. The cable is shown as underground until it heads in a western direction on poles above ground. The drawings show 3 * 0.15 ACSR 11kv cables above ground.

17.4 Telecommunications:

BT/Openreach plans show that the Industrial estate to the west is served by BT plant. The utility plans have indicated Cockhill farm is served by BT apparatus also with poles running south from Cockhill Farm. The drawings show a BT box outside the entrance to Woodlea House. BT Poles are also evident on the access road to Woodlea/Cockhill Farm. Enquiries should be made to BT/Openreach to discuss diversion works if required. Sky and Virgin service plans both show that there is no plant or services within the vicinity of the site.

We have appended the Services Information in Appendix F.



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18.0 Foundations

Foundation solutions shall be determined following receipt of the detailed Site Investigation. A review of the online BGS service shows likely ground conditions will include a sandy clay overlying stiff boulder clay.

19.0 Cut and Fill

Based on the existing topography of the site a cut/fill exercise will be required to form the development platforms and access road. Levels should remain as close to existing levels where possible when ground conditions permit to minimise the extents of the cut and fill exercise. Consideration should be given to the existing access road levels as this will form the proposed development access road. Existing drainage levels should be considered as the site drainage is likely to require to connect along the southern boundary.

20.0 Retaining Walls

Based on the existing topography of the site we are of the opinion that retaining walls would not be required between plots to minimise the extent of cut/fill and achieve the desired proposed layout. However, this will be confirmed following further detailed design.

Exact retaining wall locations and heights will be determined during detailed design. However, we are of the opinion that the any retaining walls will not be excessive and sloped embankments maybe utilised.

The architectural layout should take cognisance of the existing site levels to minimise the proposed retention requirement with consideration given to the proposed location of the access road and units located on the flattest part of the site.

21.0 Capping

Given the site has been undeveloped over the years and remained a greenfield site, it is unlikely there will be capping requirements within the landscaped areas of the site. However, a detailed site investigation should be carried out to determine capping requirements across the site.

At this stage, it should be assumed that any adopted roads will require a full 600mm capping layer.




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Proposed Architects Layout



1.0 Introduction:

1.1 Brief

We have been requested by South Ayrshire Council, to compile a Feasibility report for an alternative site development of greenfield land parcel east of Cockhill Farm, Ayr, KA6 6AH. This greenfield land parcel will be known as Site 2.

We were asked specifically to comment on any potential constraints associated with the proposed Travellers Site development. We have completed a desk top survey as part of this report. A follow up site visit was carried out on Tuesday 12th April 2022.

1.2 <u>Limitations</u>

This report is made out on the instructions of, and on behalf of South Ayrshire Council. No responsibility is accepted to any third party for the whole or any part of its contents.

Neither the whole nor any part of this report, nor any reference thereto may be included in any document, circular or statement without the written approval of this firm as to the form and context in which it will appear prior to any agreed disclosure.

No excavations have been carried out to expose the depth, nature, and condition of the subsoils to determine its load bearing ability.

Our report is restricted to the terms of our brief. Where comments are made on other aspects or areas of the land, these comments are made for information purposes. No reliance can be made on these additional comments.

No tests have been carried out on materials for strength and no drilling has been executed to determine the grades, thickness, or composition of any materials, other than noted above. We did not undertake tests in respect to deleterious materials and no assurances can be giving to the presence of such materials.

No borescope examinations have been carried out and it was not possible to inspect parts of any structures that were covered. Our inspection was limited to a survey from ground level only.

Our Engineers are not qualified to carry out inspections, or tests on specialist services and as such, none have been undertaken during the inspection. Without prejudice to the foregoing generality, such services extend to include electrical, heating, and ventilating services installations and any similar specialist services.

2.0 Site Location

The 0.53 Ha development parcel is a treebelt site located to the East of Cockhill Farm, Ayr, KA6 6AH known as Cockhill Wood. The proposed development site is generally open farmland/fields.

- Access is gained to the site via the Farm road/track off the A713 on the northeast boundary
- The nearest postal address for the site is Woodlea House, KA6 6AH
- The site is centred on approximately OS Grid Ref. NS368179 / NS3683517960
- OS Grid Coordinates are approximately Eastings = 236835, Northings = 617960

The site is bounded by:

- To the North Cockhill Wood & Carrick Glen Private Hospital
- To the East A713 Main Road/Open Fields and Mosshill Industrial Estate
- To the South Open Fields & Ayrshire Equitation Centre
- To the West Cockhill Wood/Tree Belt and open Farmland/fields




Figure 1 – Location Plan (1:25K)

We have appended the Architects proposal for the site in Appendix A. We have appended a number of photographs taken during our site visit on Tuesday 12th April 2022 in Appendix B.



3.0 <u>Site Access/Egress</u>

The current development Plan shows one access to the site highlighted below. It is proposed to access the site via the existing access road located off the main A713 road. This access point will require to be discussed and approved by South Ayrshire Council during the Planning and Roads Construction Consent stages. We have no South Ayrshire Council Roads Adoption Plans for the site. However, it is thought unlikely that the Farm access track is an adoptable road leading up to the entrance to the site.

It is thought unlikely that it will be requested from SAC that two points of access is provided for the development. Further consultation is required in this regard.

4.0 Topography

Topography varies across the site with the high ground generally located to the South East corner of the site (109mAOD) and falling towards the lowest point at the North West boundary (75mAoD). This equates to an existing longitudinal fall of approximately 1 in 14. It should be noted that this relates to the Wooded area known as Cockhill Wood and not the development parcel which will be a smaller area.

The existing levels at the four corners of the site are as follows:

- North Boundary = 75m -90m AoD
- East Boundary = 95m 109m AoD
- South Boundary = 95m 109m AoD
- West Boundary = 75m 95m AoD

Consideration should be given to the existing site topography during development of Architectural Layouts to ensure proposed layouts work with site levels. Our site visit noted that the tree belt along the southern/eastern boundary was at a higher level than the rest of the existing site with levels generally falling north/westwards. This will require consideration for the proposed access road.




Figure 3 – Location Plan showing OS Map contours



We have still to undertake a topographical survey from the site. However, we approached 4 Topographical Survey Consultants to provide quotations for the works. A tender analysis report was produced providing recommendations.

5.0 <u>Historic Site Use</u>

A review of the historic site maps (Old Maps online) was carried out for the following dates: 1863, 1897, 1905, 1955 and 1957. The historic maps have indicated the site has always been a greenfield land parcel/open countryside or forestry.

6.0 Archaeology

We are not aware of any archaeology report being carried out for the site. Therefore, we have no evidence of archaeologically significant features at or near the site. The West of Scotland Archaeology Free Online Resources Service has highlighted the following features near our site. This relates to The Old Galloway Road, built on the line and occasionally on the remains of the alleged Roman road – 'Dunston Hill'. This is to the east of Cockhill Farm/Woodlea and appears to run diagonally through the proposed site. We have appended the information in Appendix C.




Figure 4 – Extract from West of Scotland Archaeology Online Resources Service

A review of the available on-line free resources from the British Geological Survey (BGS) was undertaken. An extract is shown below.




Figure 5 – Extract from BGS Geoindex Viewer

8.0 Mineral/Geotechnical

No site investigations to date have been carried out for the existing site. A review of historical borehole records was carried out from online geological mapping to gain an understanding of the substrata. The BGS generally reports the ground conditions as —

9.0 Mining

The site lies within the Coal Authority defined Coal Mining Reporting Area and Surface Coal Resource Area and a detailed report should be carried out by a Geo-Environmental Consultant. The Coal Authority Interactive UK Mapping Service has indicated no workings (Past, Present or Shallow) are recorded within the site or its surroundings. No mine entries or abandoned mines are noted.




Figure 6 – Extract from Coal Mining Authority Interactive Map Viewer



10.0 Gas/ Environment

No site investigation works have been carried out to determine the exact gassing requirement for the site. A review of the UK Radon Mapping has highlighted the site is within the lowest band for radon with a maximum radon potential of less than 1%. This site has been identified as being within a low probability radon area and it is likely that no preclusion measures are required for this Gas. However, detailed investigations should be undertaken to confirm.




Figure 7 – Extract from Radon Interactive Map Viewer

11.0 <u>Contamination/Sulphates</u>

Given the site has been undeveloped over the years and remained a greenfield site, it is unlikely there will be many risk sources of contamination to the land. However, a detailed site investigation should be carried out to confirm presence of any potential contamination within the land.

12.0 Ecology

No ecology report has been prepared for the development.

There appears to be open countryside and tree belt within the site and a habitat/ecological survey should be carried out the confirm the presence of any protected species. This is likely to be required for Planning purposes.



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13.0 Arboriculture

It should be noted that there appears to be a significant tree line running along the perimeter of the site boundary. A tree survey may be required should any of the trees be removed. Again, this is likely to be required for Planning purposes. We understand that certain areas of Cockhill wood have been subject to de-foresting. As keeping with typical Forestry policy — the perimeter trees have been left with the remaining trees cut to stump level above ground.

No invasive plant survey has been carried out to confirm the presence of any problematic species on site such Japanese Knotweed, Himalayan Balsam etc. This could be carried out during the Site Investigation works or by an independent Arboriculturist report.

14.0 Drainage

14.1 <u>Existing Surface Water Drainage</u>

Scottish Water records show there is currently no Surface Water infrastructure within the site, which is in keeping with the previous agricultural land use. However, it should be noted that it may be possible that land drainage exists within the site which will be encountered and disturbed during the proposed development works. There is likely to be a series of field drains within the site development to encourage irrigation and drainage at the site.

The records show Issues/watercourse on the northern boundary – see Figure 8. We noted during our site visit that there is a small watercourse within the wooded area on the northern boundary. There is also has a storm water outfall within the boundary. We could not determine the extents of this watercourse. Our site visit of 12th April shows that the 750mm diameter surface water sewer terminates within the site as a concrete headwall on the northeastern boundary. We noted that the coordinates for the storm water outfall were E236818, N618116.

14.2 Proposed Surface Water Drainage

The surface water drainage will incorporate traditional road gullies or SUDS system that connects into an end of line SUDS feature such as a porous paving or a conveyance Swale. The outfall from the SUDS features will connect into the existing issues or minor watercourse along the northern boundary.

The Scottish Water Service Drawings indicate two pipes running along the northern boundary of the site with Carrick Glen. One of these is noted to be a 750mm diameter surface water sewer.

It would be prudent to ensure that there is provision for a surface water connection from the development and approval must be sought from Scottish Water and the relevant Statutory Authorities.



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We have not carried out any calculations to show the size of the SUDS scheme. However, it is likely that SUDS feature will incorporate a minimum attenuation and storage volume for the 1 in 30-year event + 40% Climate Change. This will include a 1 in 200year flooding design check. The size and layout of the SUDS feature will be confirmed during detailed design.

The Greenfield run off rate will require to be calculated for the SUDS features. This will be the controlling discharge for the proposed development. This will require to be agreed with South Ayrshire Council and Scottish Water.

It should be noted that the South Ayrshire Council Local Authority Flooding Department will request the SUDS feature sized to allow for temporary storage during the 1 in 30/200-year storm events. Enquiries with the relevant parties should be made early in the development process to ensure agreement is reached between Scottish Water and the Local Authority regarding any adoption agreement.

It is also likely that Scottish Water will require a CCTV prior to connection approvals.

14.3 Existing Foul Water Drainage:

Scottish Water records show there is currently no Foul Water infrastructure within the site, which is in keeping with the previous agricultural land use. We are unsure at present of foul water drainage for the nearby Carrick Glen Hospital. It is thought likely that this connects to the combined sewer nearby.

The Scottish Water Service Drawings indicate two pipes running along the northern boundary of the site with Carrick Glen. One of these is noted to be a 375mm diameter combined sewer -likely taking foul and storm water. This pipe originates in the Mosshill Industrial Estate to the east of the development. They appear to head in a northern direction before heading westwards to the north of Cockhill Farm and Woodlea House – see Figure 8.

A Pre-Development Enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm capacity of the local Wastewater network prior to detailed design.

14.4 Proposed Water Supply Pipes

Water supply pipes are noted to run in the main A713 Road. The service plans show Cockhill Farm and Woodlea are served by water supply pipes in the access road leading to the properties. It is also likely that water supply pipes feed the Carrick Glen private hospital to the north.

Water supply pipework will require a UKWIR Assessment along the proposed water supply route associated with any new development. This will be carried out as part of the site investigation works.

A Pre-development enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm the network can supply the proposed development.

We have appended the Drainage and Services Plans in Appendix E.

15.0 Roads

Finalised road construction will be verified following the provision of CBR testing at 25m centres on the underlying strata along the proposed road length. A selection of initial CBR testing should be undertaken as part of the site investigation works to gain an insight into the underlying strata. If the access road is to remain private, this requirement would not be so onerous.

Our site visit noted that the tree belt is at a higher level than the rest of the site with levels generally falling northwards. New access roads will require to form the development with gradients no steeper than 1 in 13 or 15. A topographic survey will be required to confirm suitable design levels for the roads and development.

At this stage, it should be assumed that any adopted roads would require a full road box construction.

16.0 Flooding

A review of the SEPA Flood maps confirms that the site is not at risk of flooding from Rivers, Coastal or Surface Water. See attached extract below. There appears to be a low to high likelihood of surface water flooding along the northern boundary of the site within the Glen Carrick development. This is noted generally in the middle of the Private hospital site.

It is likely that South Ayrshire Council will request a detailed Flood Risk Assessment should be carried out for the development during the Pre-Planning Enquiry.




Figure 9 – Extract from SEPA Flood Maps



17.0 **Existing Services**

In addition to the existing drainage services discussed in sections 14.2 and 14.3, the following utilities infrastructure is located within the vicinity of the site:

17.1 Water:

Scottish Water records show that there is a 150mm – 200mm Diameter in the grass verge within the main A713 Road. There is also a 90mm HPPE Water supply pipe located within the access road leading to Cockhill Farm. This heads past Cockhill Farm before heading southwards towards the Ayrshire Equitation Centre. A 2" Cast iron pipe is also noted to head north after Cockhill Farm.




Figure 10 – Extract from Scottish Water Water Supply Drawings

Figure 10 below shows a 150mm/200mm DIL supply pipe on both sides of the A713 Road verge.

A Pre-Development Enquiry should be submitted to Scottish Water to confirm the proposed development can be supplied.

17.2 Gas:

SGN utility plans show that there are no services present within our site. Enquiries should be to be made to SGN to ensure sufficient capacity is available to service the proposed development if required.

17.3 Electricity:




Figure 11 – Extract from SPEN Services plans – cables noted on other side of A713 Road

Scottish Power Energy Network location plans appear to show there are no overhead cables or plant within the areas of the alternative site. Figure 11 shows overhead cables and poles on the other side of the A713 road heading northwest, but do not appear to enter the alternative site.

Electricity cables are noted to head south from Cockhill Farm and Woodlea in the SPEN drawings.






Figure 12 – Extract from SPEN Services Plans – underground and overground Cables noted within site

The above extract shows 95mm AL HV underground cables in the main A713 Road heading north but is shown as Out of Use. This enters our site boundary next to the existing fence/gate. The cable is shown as underground until it heads in a western direction on poles above ground. The drawings show 3 * 0.15 ACSR 11kv cables above ground.

17.4 Telecommunications:

BT/Openreach plans show that the Industrial estate to the west is served by BT plant. The utility plans have indicated Cockhill farm is served by BT apparatus also with poles running south from Cockhill Farm. The drawings show a BT box outside the entrance to Woodlea House. BT Poles and overhead lines are evident on the access road to Woodlea/Cockhill Farm. Enquiries should be made to BT/Openreach to discuss diversion works if required. Sky and Virgin service plans both show that there is no plant or services within the vicinity of the site.

We have appended the Services Information in Appendix F. Our photographs in Appendix B show the BT poles and overhead cables on site access road.



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18.0 Foundations

Foundation solutions shall be determined following receipt of the detailed Site Investigation. A review of the online BGS service shows likely ground conditions will include a sandy clay overlying stiff boulder clay.

19.0 Cut and Fill

Based on the existing topography of the site a cut/fill exercise will be required to form the development platforms and access road. Levels should remain as close to existing levels where possible when ground conditions permit to minimise the extents of the cut and fill exercise. Consideration should be given to the existing access road levels as this will form the proposed development access road. Existing drainage levels should be considered as the site drainage is likely to require to connect along the northern boundary.

20.0 Retaining Walls

Based on the existing topography of the site we are of the opinion that retaining walls will be required between plots or roads to minimise the extent of cut/fill and achieve the desired proposed layout. However, this will be confirmed following further detailed design.

Exact retaining wall locations and heights will be determined during detailed design. However, we are of the opinion that the any retaining walls will not be excessive and sloped embankments maybe utilised.

The architectural layout should take cognisance of the existing site levels to minimise the proposed retention requirement with consideration given to the proposed location of the access road and units located on the flattest part of the site.

21.0 Capping

Given the site has been undeveloped over the years and remained a greenfield site, it is unlikely there will be capping requirements within the landscaped areas of the site. However, a detailed site investigation should be carried out to determine capping requirements across the site.

At this stage, it should be assumed that any adopted roads will require a full 600mm capping layer.







Subject: General Services Capital Programme 2021/22: Monitoring Report as at 31 March 2021

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to update Cabinet on the actual capital expenditure and income, together with progress made on the General Services capital programme projects as at 31 March 2022 (Period 12), and to agree the changes to budgets in future years.

2. Recommendation

2.1 It is recommended that Cabinet:

- 2.1.1 notes the progress made on the delivery of the General Services Capital Programme to 31 March 2022, resulting in spend of £66,230,255 or 100.42%, as detailed in Appendix 1 attached;
- 2.1.2 approves the adjustments contained in Appendix 2 attached; and
- 2.1.3 approves the revised budget for 2022/23 at £128,973,955 and 2023/24 at £82,984,577, along with future years budgets as detailed in Appendix 2.

3. Background

- 3.1 The General Services Capital Programme for 2021/22 was approved by South Ayrshire Council on 4 March 2021.
- 3.2 The General Services Capital Programme for 2022/23 to 2033/34 was approved by South Ayrshire Council of 3 March, 2022 through the paper 'Revenue Estimates 2022/23, Capital Estimates 2022/23 to 2033/34, and Carbon Budget 2022/23' and incorporated all adjustments made to the Programme throughout 2021/22.
- 3.3 The current budget approved for 2021/22 is £65,951,864.

4. Proposals

4.1 The total spend on the General Services Capital Programme during financial year 2021/22 of £66,230,255 was significantly higher than the total spend in the previous year of £33,334,306. This is in part due to the gradual easing of Covid Restrictions meaning more works have been able to be progressed.

4.2 The spend in 2021/22 was slightly higher than the approved budget at 100.42%. This overspend is due to projects progressing faster than anticipated and this is a profiling adjustment rather than a requirement for additional funding. Appropriate requests to advance funds from 2022/23 have been made through this report.

4.3 Works Completed

4.3.1 A number of projects have completed since the last report, including Forehill PS - Reconfiguration of Nursery Area, Dundonald PS Extension - Acoustic Measures and Ayr Old Kirk - Works to Churchyard Walls (Phase 2 - Rebuilding/Repairing).

4.4 Works Ongoing

- 4.4.1 Works continue on site at Straiton Primary School Conversion of School House to Staff Suite, Space Place EYC Extension and the Riverside Project, Ayr / Public Realm Space, High Street, Ayr.
- 4.4.2 New projects have started on site at Kyle Academy Refurbishment Works Science Dept Upgrade), Symington Primary Extension (GP Room and Storage), and Prestwick Pool Additional Gym Facilities.
- 4.4.3 New contracts have recently been let for Wallacetown Early Years Centre Formation of New Entrance, Cunningham Place Children's Home Independent Living Flat and Doonfoot Primary School Communication Classes Refurbishment. Pre-start meetings are being arranged to determine programmes of work.
- 4.4.4 The major projects previously highlighted continue to progress well and include Carrick Academy (Maybole Campus), Sacred Heart Primary, the Shared Campus Project (Glenburn and St Ninian's Primary Schools) and Craigie Additional Sporting Facility.
- 4.4.5 A number of projects have completed within ongoing programmes of work, including Window and Roof Replacement Various Projects, Property Refurbishment Various Projects, Equalities Act Budget Various Properties, Ayrshire Roads Alliance Managed projects and ICT Programmes.
- 4.4.6 Detailed design works continue to be progressed on a number of projects for 2022/23, including Coylton PS Reconfiguration of Main Entrance & Reception, Girvan Academy Conversion of Library to ICT Suite 2022/23 and the Relocation of Mossblown War Memorial.
- 4.5 The project information contained in Appendix 1 has been broken down over the Council wards and a document showing this has been made available to Members in the Members' area (Hub) on Re-Wired (see background papers).
- 4.6 Appendix 2 details budget adjustments being put forward for approval by Cabinet as part of the Period 12 report. These adjustments include (a) recognise additional grant income from the Scottish Government, Strathclyde Passenger for Transport and SUSTRANS; (b) a number of internal re-allocations of budgets between projects; (c) a number of transfers of budgets from 2021/22 to 2022/23 and beyond

- to reflect current profiled spend for projects; and (d) a number of transfers of budgets from 2022/23 to 2021/22 to reflect current profiled spend for projects.
- 4.7 As previously reported, disruption continues to supply chains and labour due to Covid-19 and the UK's exit from the EU.

5. Legal and Procurement Implications

- 5.1 There are no legal implications arising from this report.
- 5.2 There are no procurement implications arising from this report.

6. Financial Implications

- Per Table 1 of Appendix 1, at the end of P12, actual expenditure stood at £66,230,255. Income for this period stood at £66,230,255. Based on the budget of £65,951,864, actual expenditure of £66,230,255 equates to an overall spend of 100.42% at the end of Period 12.
- 6.2 Proposals contained in this report, if approved, would lead to revised programmes in 2022/23 of £128,973,955 and 2023/24 of £82,984,577. Requests have been made for re-profiling of budgets as highlighted in Section 4.6 above.

7. Human Resources Implications

7.1 Not applicable.

8. Risk

8.1.1 There are no risks associated with adopting the recommendations.

Subject: Write-offs: Council Tax, Non-Domestic Rates, Customer Invoicing and Housing Benefit Overpayments

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek the approval of Members to write-off Council Tax, Non-Domestic Rates, Housing Benefit Overpayments and Customer Invoicing Accounts in accordance with Council policy.

2. Recommendation

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Cabinet:
 - 2.1.1 approves the write-off of Council Tax amounting to £16,103.06;
 - 2.1.2 approves the write-off of Non-Domestic Rates amounting to £67,194.72;
 - 2.1.3 approves the write-off of Housing Benefit Overpayments amounting to £36,006.80; and
 - 2.1.4 approves the write-off of Customer Invoicing Accounts amounting to £11,619.18.

3. Background

3.1 Current approved procedures allow for the write-off of Council Tax, Non-Domestic Rates, Customer Invoicing and Housing Benefit Overpayments once all attempts to recover such debts have been exhausted.

4. Proposals

4.1 Council Tax

- 4.1.1 The total amount submitted to Cabinet for write-off for cases above £10,000 is £16,103.06.
- 4.1.2 In addition, write-offs of Council Tax accounts amounting to £336,181.52 in respect of cases under £10,000 have been approved by the Head of Finance and ICT in accordance with section 7 (FICT10) of the Council's Scheme of Delegation.

4.1.3 A total of £469.787.10 was approved for write off in 2020/21.

4.2 Non-Domestic Rates

- 4.2.1 The total amount submitted to Cabinet for write-off for cases above £10,000 is £67,194.72.
- 4.2.2 In addition, write-offs of Non-Domestic Rates amounting to £75,410.85 in respect of cases under £10,000 have been approved by the Head of Finance and ICT in accordance with section 7 (FICT10) of the Council's Scheme of Delegation.
- 4.2.3 A total of £277,540 was written off in 2020/21.

4.3 Housing Benefit Overpayments

- 4.3.1 The total amount submitted to Cabinet for write-off for cases above £10,000 is £36,006.80.
- 4.3.2 In addition, write-offs for Housing Benefit Overpayments amounting to £465,413.07 in respect of cases under £10,000 have been approved by the Head of Finance and ICT in accordance with section 7 (FICT10) of the Council's Scheme of Delegation.
- 4.3.3 A total of £386,187.81 was approved for write off in 2020/21.

4.4 Customer Invoicing

- 4.4.1 The total amount submitted to Cabinet for write-off for cases above £10,000 is £11,619.18.
- 4.4.2 Write-offs for Customer Invoicing accounts amounting to £45,499.55 in respect of cases under £10,000 have been approved by the Head of Finance and ICT in accordance with section 7 (FICT10) of the Council's Scheme of Delegation.
- 4.4.3 A total of £61,810.61 was approved for write off in 2020/21.
- 4.5 A full list of all write-offs is available for Members' only consideration, on the Elected Members' Portal.
- 4.6 The write-offs are fully provided for in the existing bad debt provision. Members should note, however, that debts will continue to be pursued, where claims have been lodged with the Trustee in relation to debtors in liquidation or subject to sequestration.
