			To be eligible for funding organisations must be BAME-led. For the purposes of this Fund a "BAME-led organisation" is defined as having a majority of its governing body (or staff make-up) from BAME communities, with its services designed, targeted and delivered to BAME communities.
			Organisations that are not constituted, do not have a bank account, or are a new organisation can still apply for funding via a host organisation which meets the criteria listed above.

			The aim of the fund is to support organisations to take ownership of the distribution of funding in their area and strengthen and broaden their links with freelance youth arts practitioners.
			The overall budget for this fund is £700,000 with at least £500,000 for music and up to £200,000 for wider art forms. Grants of between £10,000 and £50,000 are available to organisations and local authorities to distribute grants of between £500 and £5,000 directly to individual freelance artists/creative practitioners. All applicants can apply to cover 100% of their costs but applicants are welcome to include additional partnership funding.
			Applications are invited from local authorities, arts organisations and third sector organisations. Organisations applying do not need to have an arts focus but they do need to have a track record in supporting/delivering youth arts activity and the capacity to deliver a small grants fund.

Rapid Recovery Challenge	Up to £475,000	Open	Registered UK businesses, charities, community interest companies, community groups and public bodies are invited to apply for support to accelerate innovations that can help vulnerable workers that have been hardest hit by the coronavirus crisis to access jobs and financial help.
			This programme is funded by Nesta in partnership with JP Morgan Chase Foundation and Money and Pensions Service. Nesta is a registered charity, operating as the UK's innovation foundation and supporting new ideas that are able to address some of the major challenges of modern times.
			Nesta has identified what it describes as an 'urgent need' to support people at risk of losing their livelihoods and financial security in the wake of the coronavirus crisis. Nesta believes there is a requirement for innovative products and services that can help families build savings easily, enable them to access financial assistance that exists already, provide tailored advice and support, and give much greater access to affordable credit.
			The Rapid Recovery Challenge has been launched to stimulate innovation in the fields of employment, skills and financial services. The programme will find and support tools and services that improve access to jobs and money for people across the UK, focusing on those hardest hit by the economic shock resulting from coronavirus (COVID-19).
			Nesta will award 12 participants an initial prize, based on plans to scale their products to 10,000+ users. Depending on their progress, up to six finalists will later be awarded more funds to help reach a further 50,000 users. The whole process is expected to take a year, with the aim that the solutions supported by the prize will ultimately reach one million people in the UK by 2023.
			The Challenge has two streams:
			Job Recovery Stream - supporting solutions that connect younger workers or those in (or who have recently lost) low-paid or insecure work into open jobs that match their skill sets. To help make these connections to live jobs, Nesta expects solutions in this stream may also provide tailored learning, training, or advice to people seeking work.

			Financial Recovery Stream - supporting solutions that help younger workers or those in (or who have recently lost) low-paid or insecure work access financial assistance more easily, manage their cash flow or, where necessary, access affordable, responsible credit. The Challenge will support solutions that positively impact:
			 Those currently or recently (within the past 12 months) in low paid roles. 'Low paid' is defined as earning less than £18,252/year (60% or less the national median annual pay in 2019, £30,420). Those currently or recently (within the past 12 months) in insecure roles. An 'insecure role' is defined as temporary contracts less than six months, variable (zero-hour) contracts or self-employed earning less than £18,252/year. Young people, whether employed or unemployed. 'Young people' are defined as those aged 16-24. The Challenge's target end users are statistically more likely to be women, migrants, those from Black ethnic groups, and those in particular geographic areas. Supporting these groups might be one way, but not the only way, for solutions to have a meaningful impact.
			Throughout the Challenge, Nesta will support innovators to develop and scale their potential solutions and expand their reach and impact. The two winning projects will be announced at the end of the programme in September 2021.
			The programme has a total prize fund of £2.8 million. Funds will be released in increments, with funding being awarded at each stage, as follows:
			 In December 2020, 12 semi-finalists (six in each stream) will each receive £125,000. In May 2021, six finalists (three in each stream) will each receive £150,000. In September 2021, two winners (one in each stream) will each receive £200,000. In addition to funding, the challenge will offer participants non-financial support from internal experts and external partners. Participants will have a dedicated member of the Nesta team to help them access this support and navigate all elements of the challenge.
			To support the most promising innovations from the not-for-profit sector, at least six semi-finalist awards will be made to not-for-profit organisations in each stream. And, in the next stage, at least two finalist awards will be made to not-for-profit organisations for solutions in either stream.

In the last decade, the Fund has awarded over £10 million to more than 350 projects across the UK. The Fund is supported by the People's Postcode Lottery.
			The theme for this round is Rural Community Resilience. Applications should build on some of the amazing projects that came about as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, and the effect that this had on rural communities. The funding is for projects which protect or boost community assets and enterprises, or otherwise strengthen the sense of community.
			Rural Community Resilience means different things to different communities, and in this case refers to projects which will allow the community to survive and thrive, especially when facing a situation which affects everyday rural life.
			Grants of up to £10,000 are available for up to one year. Projects must be completed within one year of their start date and no later than 31 March 2022. Some match funding is expected. Groups should have at least raised some local funding if the project is needed by the local community.

			A total of £1 million is available for the next financial year with grants of up to £35,000 to cover a period of one year.
			The maximum grant depends on whether the organisation is incorporated (£35,000) or unincorporated (£5,000). The average grant award is likely to be around £15,000. Grants are for 12 months only and all funded activities must take place between 1 April 2021 and 31 March 2022.
			The funding is for projects and activities that benefit both disabled children and young people (aged 20 and under) and their carers, by providing a break from their normal routine. These breaks should increase opportunities for disabled children and young people to engage in activities they enjoy, give carers a break from their caring role, and improve wellbeing for all involved.
			The grants will support a wide range of short breaks projects and activities, including overnight stays, residential breaks, days out, and shorter regular activities and sessions.
