Introduction

South Ayrshire Council is currently undertaking Place Plans with many of the communities in South Ayrshire. These plans are at the heart of a new approach to placemaking in South Ayrshire, one that is embedded within, and driven by the Community's own concerns and aspirations. The aim is to develop plans collaboratively with the community that are a true reflection of the priorities of those who live and work in the towns and villages of South Ayrshire. The plans will provide a series of actions that the community, the Council and other partners can work together in delivering.

Between October 2021 and January 2022, the Council undertook a series of Community Conversations with the community in Craigie, that sought to identify the main concerns facing residents. This report presents the findings from the engagements and provides the basis from which the next round of conversations can take place where actions to address priorities will be developed.

Outcome of Engagement

The Community Conversations in Craigie began in October 2021 and continued through January 2022. The engagement consisted of a number of focused meetings with community groups as well as an online survey. The Scottish Government designed Place Standard toolkit was used to measure and assess the community's priorities.

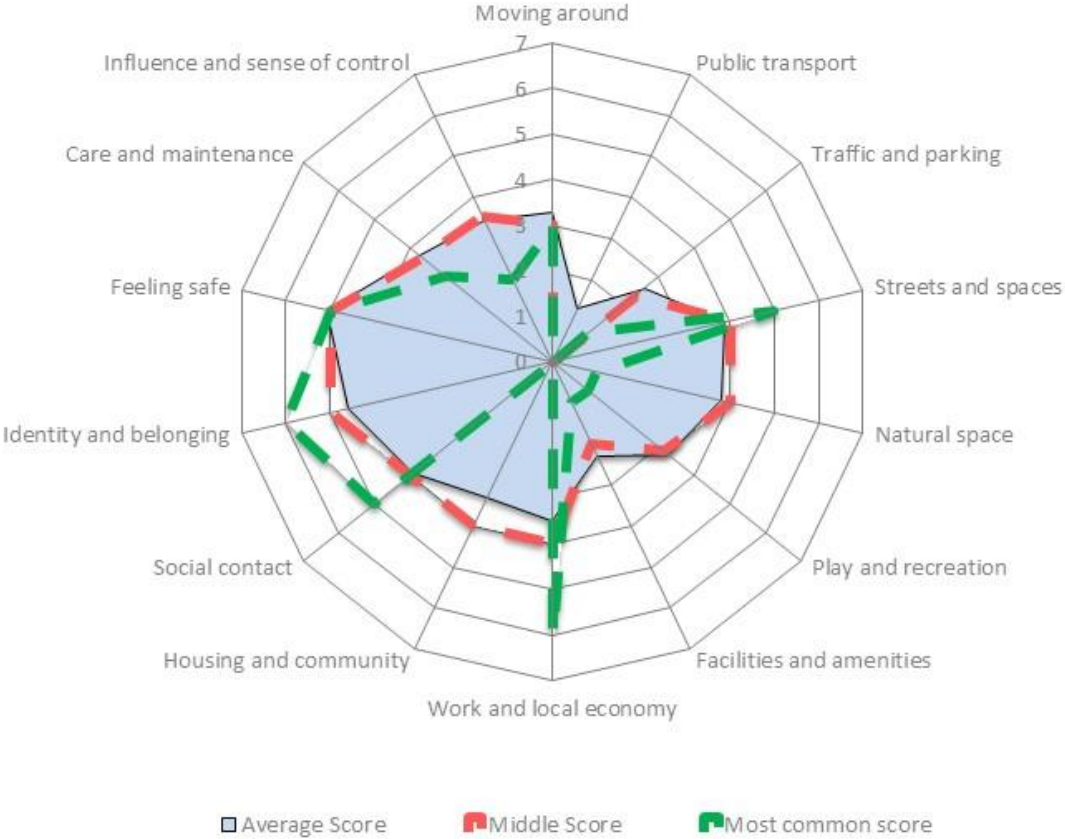
The Place Standard sees a score awarded for each of the identified topics that make up a successful place. This ranges from 1, where most improvement is needed, to 7, where no improvement is needed. The scores given by each member of the community who took part were averaged to give an indication of priorities. A total of 32 people took part in the consultation including through 1 community meeting, 12 paper copy surveys and 8 online surveys.

The findings of the consultation are laid out in the table below, and in the diagram on the following page. There were seven areas that were identified as being of particular concern, with scores below the median of 3.5. These were the topics of Public Transport, Facilities and Amenities, Traffic and Parking, Moving Around, Play and Recreation, Housing and Community and Influence and Sense of Control.

At the other end of the scale Streets and Spaces, Identity and Belonging, Feeling Safe scored highly.

Play and Recreation = 3.3

Positive

Village hall – used for various activities
Village hall – accessed by range of groups of all ages

Negative

No facilities for young children
No school, no shop, no pub
No outdoor/sporting opportunities

Suggestion

- A swingpark for kids would be beneficial where kids could play and get to know each other

Housing and Community = 3.3

Positive

The homes meet the needs of the village
Nice area to live in – good homes and community

Negative

Only affluent – all private
No social housing
Shortage of affordable housing

Comment

- Desirable area with private housing
- Cheap properties to buy if you can secure and afford a mortgage

Moving Around = 3.3

Positive

Lots of cyclists / walkers
Lots of routes to walk
Access to quiet country roads
Scenery is good to see

Negative

Roads aren't wide enough to put in paths
Roads are in poor condition
No cycle routes
Dangerous crossroads

Suggestions

- Signs need replaced
- No seating on routes
- Cycle lanes on country roads

Influence and Sense of Control = 3.4

Positive

Place planning was a positive – asking community to participate
Community council works hard to inform the community
Thriving Places initiative is a great idea

Negative

Same issues at every community council meeting
Local authority could do more for the village – don't listen to issues / action problems
Frustration with planning

Suggestion

- Link officers needed back – signposting is important

Work and Local Economy = 3.5**Positive**

No unemployed in the village
 Farming
 Few local small businesses

Negative

No local people employed in local businesses
 Business opportunities thwarted by council –
 planning rules very prohibitive
 Lack of employment opportunities

Comments

- More a commuter village
- Farming the main industry

Care and Maintenance = 3.7**Positive**

People look after their property well
 Always clean and tidy – amazing litter picking
 neighbours
 Planters are nice

Negative

Litter/flytipping in lay-bys
 Dog fouling an issue at times

Suggestion

- More bins should be available on the Main Street
- Hall is maintained by income from users

Natural Space = 3.8**Positive**

Rural – lots of natural space and farmland
 Lovely views
 Access to lovely countryside

Negative

No communal natural space
 Rubbish lying around
 Quarry used as a day out for people
 Access to openspace – farm owned

Suggestion

- Nice to have walking/cycling/bridle path around the village
- Village green to be used for community events
- Flat area for children to play – not a playpark

Streets and Spaces = 3.9**Positive**

Village is beautiful

Negative

Speeding vehicles
 Access to historic buildings and sites
 Limited lighting in winter

Suggestion

- Barnwheel monument should be repaired and access allowed inside
- Noticeboard featuring history of the area

Social Contact = 3.9**Positive**

Hall well used – heart of the community
 Active community council
 Good range of initiatives in the area

Negative

Losing the church affected community spirit
 More unsocial due to covid and media
 Restricted number of people involve themselves in community events

Suggestion

- More investment from public funding is needed
- Only have the village hall

Identity and Belonging = 4.6**Positive**

Lots of groups to join
 Lots of history
 Strong farming identity
 Positive friendly community

Negative

Commuter village
 Loss of pub and church were detrimental
 Difficult to immerse in community
 People are more transient

Comment

- Feel connected to rural community but less connected to those in village
- No meeting place apart from village hall

Feeling Safe = 5.1**Positive**

Within village feel safe
 Feel safe during the day
 I feel very safe

Negative

Only at night – unsafe with drugs
 Do not feel safe on the roads
 Flytipping / Antisocial behaviour – people from outwith the area (quarry/lay-by)
 Wildlife crime, farm thefts,

Next Steps

The community conversations undertaken to date have established the strengths and weaknesses and priority issues facing Craigie. This information will be used as the baseline for developing actions that will form the final Place Plan in due course. A number of workshops will now be held with community groups to further investigate the issues and possible actions that could be undertaken to address these.
