Priorities for Action

Engagement outcomes July 2022



Introduction

South Ayrshire Council is currently undertaking Place Plans with many of the communities in South Ayrshire. These plans are at the heart of a new approach to placemaking in South Ayrshire, one that is embedded within, and driven by the Community's own concerns and aspirations. The aim is to develop plans collaboratively with the community that are a true reflection of the priorities of those who live and work in the towns and villages of South Ayrshire. The plans will provide a series of actions that the community, the Council and other partners can work together in delivering.

Between January and February 2022, the Council undertook a series of Community Conversations with the community in Prestwick, that sought to identify the main concerns facing residents. This report presents the findings from the engagements and provides the basis from which the next round of conversations can take place where actions to address priorities will be developed.

Outcome of Engagement

The Community Conversations in Prestwick began in January 2022 and continued through February 2022. The engagement consisted of a number of focused meetings with community groups as well as an online survey. The Scottish Government designed Place Standard toolkit was used to measure and assess the community's priorities.


The Place Standard sees a score awarded for each of the identified topics that make up a successful place. This ranges from 1, where most improvement is needed, to 7, where no improvement is needed. The scores given by each member of the community who took part were averaged to give an indication of priorities. A total of 191 people took part in the consultation including from 4 community groups, and 168 online surveys.

The findings of the consultation are laid out in the table below, and in the diagram on the following page. All of the topics in Prestwick scored relatively well with no areas below to 3.5 median score, the areas with the lowest scores were traffic and parking (score of 4), influence and sense of control (score of 4) and moving around (score of 4.4).

At the other end of the scale Feeling Safe, Identity and Belonging and facilities and amenities scored highly.
