Definition of Strand	Examples of activity (not limited to)
Local Spending – buying goods and services locally to create dense local supply chains.	 Buying goods, services or produce locally and developing stronger local supply chains or a circular economy; Growing the local supply base by providing goods or services, or showcasing other local suppliers (e.g. within a shop)
2. Fair Employment – encouraging fair pay and conditions for all individuals, recruiting locally where possible and providing meaningful progression and training opportunities.	 Organisations working towards paying the real Living Wage; Employing people facing barriers to employment (e.g. people with disabilities, those with caring responsibilities);
3. Land and Assets – maximising the function and ownership of local land and assets for the benefit of communities and enterprises.	 Feasibility studies for organisations who want to use / take ownership of local land or property assets for community or enterprise use; Developing an existing asset to support or grow community or enterprise activity.
4. Financial Power – listening to communities and local enterprises and increasing investment where it is needed most.	 Providing services which improve access to affordable banking or financial advice, particularly for marginalised groups; Organisations or initiatives which invest in / support other local enterprises to incentivise local spending or improve social and environmental purposes.
5. Ownership – encouraging creation of more generative enterprise models (e.g. SME's, social enterprise, Employee Ownership)	 Organisations who want to establish or transition to a more generative enterprise model e.g. Employee ownership, cooperative, social or community enterprise; Organisations who want to grow or develop an existing generative enterprise model to enhance their social or environmental purpose.
